CHAPTER - 0.: EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

0.1 Background

The Ministry of Road transport & Highways (MoRT&H) has been entrusted with the assignment of Consultancy Services for feasibility study and preparation of Detailed Project Report for improvement and up-gradation of in principle declared National Highways in the State of Uttar Pradesh.

M/s Chaitanya Projects Consultancy Pvt. Ltd. in Association with Agnitio Infrastructure Project Pvt. Ltd. has been appointed as Technical Consultants vide MoRT&H letter no. RO/LKO/DPR/I.P.NH/2016-17 dated 3rd January 2017 to carry out the Consultancy Services for feasibility study and preparation of Detailed Project Report for improvement and upgradation of in principle declared National Highways in the State of Uttar Pradesh on Engineering, Procurement and Construction (EPC) basis.

The Project road starts from T-Junction with NH- 92 near Bus stand at Bewar (District. – Mainpuri) and passes through Madanpur, Mohammdabad, Farrukhabad, Jalalabad, MiranpurKatra, Khudaganj, Bisalpur and ends at Pilibhit (Junction with NH 730) .The project stretches from Bewar to Bisalpur via Farrukhabad, Jalalabad, MiranpurKatra, Khudaganj, Radhaita has been designated as National Highway No. 730 C and from Bisalpur to Pilibhit via Barkhra as National Highway No. 731K. The total length of the project road is 183.380 Km.

0.2 Project Purpose

The project is envisaged to augment capacity for safe and efficient movement of traffic in the National Highways (NH-730C & NH-731K) corridor where the intensity of traffic has increased significantly. Improvements of these selected national highways would improve connectivity, facilitate speedy and smooth transportation with less interruption at a lesser transport cost and in less time, induce economic development of existing growth centres, provide impetus for the development of new growth centres, employment generation and as a consequence poverty alleviation in the project areas.

0.3 Approach and methodology

The approach underlying the assessment of social impacts and developing appropriate mitigation strategies is based on the principles of local participation and consultations with stakeholders, including vulnerable groups. The SIA study has been carried out with a participatory approach by involving the stakeholders, particularly the project beneficiaries and likely affected persons through a series of consultative processes and techniques. The impacts have been assessed by collecting both quantitative and qualitative types of data.

0.4 Objectives of Resettlement Action Plan (RAP)

The RAP is prepared to ensure that the affected persons are: (i) informed about their options and rights pertaining to resettlement; (ii) provided prompt and effective compensation at full replacement cost for loss of assets caused due to the project; (iii) provided assistance (such as shifting allowance, transition allowance, etc.) during relocation and for a transition period, to restore their livelihood and standards of living; and, (iv) provided with skill development assistance such as training, in addition to compensation.

The Objectives of RAP are:

- To identify adverse impacts and determine mitigation measures;
- To present the entitlements and action plan for the affected persons for payment of compensation and assistance for restoring livelihoods and improving or at least retaining the living standards in the post resettlement period.

0.5 Project Impact

Socio-economic profile of the project affected households has been worked out on the basis of Census & Socio-economic survey conducted for land, structures and other properties likely to be affected. Census survey establishes that 1242 Nos. structures including 1166 private structures, in which 1592 structures are Squatters and they are on government land and 76 CPRs (33 government, 43 religious and 0 community' properties) will be affected in the project. A total of 162 vulnerable families (129 rural artisan & 33) are getting affected.

Out of 1166 private structures getting affected 996 belong to Titleholders and 170 to Non-title holders., all non-titleholders are having temporary type of structures, Out of 1166 structures, 106 residential, 1006 commercial and 54 are residential cum commercial. The number of project affected populations (PAPs) is 8162 which include male is 55% and 45% female.

There will be private land acquisition of 9.8058 hectare with impact on 78 plots for the proposed project which includes 9.2706 hectare of agricultural land, 0.1112 hectare of barren, 0.00 hectare forest land and 0.00 hectare of residential/commercial land and remaining 0.4240 hectare of any other land. 78 plots, out of which 63 plots were Private and 15 were Government Plot covered in census survey. Census survey reveals that 78 plots having 202 households which are altogether 1414 persons (family members of affected households). Mitigation Measures

Conscious efforts have been made for avoidance of land acquisition and minimize the adverse social impacts as integral part of the entire project preparation and design of the proposed road. Wherever unavoidable, efforts to minimize impacts through design interventions have worked out for the project. Improvements are planned within the available EROW/ land width. The cross sections are designed to accommodate with the existing ROW/ land width. As per the width required in the Corridor of Impact (CoI) for the actual construction of the road, which include carriageway, shoulders and embankments, the social inputs to the project design shall ensure that the COI is reduced, within the acceptable design principle and standards, to minimize the adverse social impacts.

0.6 Public Consultations

Public consultation meetings were held in 24 locations ,in which total of 278 Community Member including 265 male and 13 female participated long the project corridor with road side communities to obtain their views and suggestions regarding the proposed project interventions. The consultations have provided inputs towards mitigation of impacts, improvement in designs, and preparation of resettlement plan and its implementation. Based on the suggestions, design modifications including realignment and bypasses, provision of road safety measures such as pedestrian crossings, warning signs, markings, etc have been carried out.

0.7 Implementation Arrangement

The Institutional Arrangements will be set up at three levels viz., MoRT&H (Central Govt.), State Level and Sub-Project Level on partnership model wherein concerned agencies at different levels supplement and complement each other efforts. The key elements of institutional arrangements are co-operation/support, collaboration and sharing of responsibilities with clearly defined roles, involvement of key stakeholders and vertical and horizontal linkages amongst different agencies.

0.8 Grievance Redress Mechanism

The Resettlement Policy Framework (RPF) mandates formation of Grievance Redressal Mechanism in order to resolve disputes in an effective manner and at the door steps of the PAPs. In the project RAP implementation there is a need for an efficient Grievance Redress Mechanism (GRM) that will assist the APs in resolving their queries and complaints. Therefore, formation of Grievance Redress Committee (GRC) will be most important for grievance redress and it is anticipated that most, if not all grievances, would be settled by the GRC. The grievance redress committee members and their responsibilities are given in details in **Chapter 11** of GRM.

0.9 RAP Implementation Schedule

The construction tenure of the corridor is 24 months. The on-ground rehabilitation and resettlement exercises and handing over the encumbrance free stretch for civil works will take 5 months and afterwards, the NGO will carry out awareness programs on road safety, HIV/AIDS prevention campaign, repeat training for PAPs, facilitate overall monitoring, etc.

0.10 Resettlement Budget

The resettlement budget **Rs 63.42 Crores** includes components such as compensation for land and structure (private property, cultural property and community assets), R&R assistance and contingency to cover unforeseen / unanticipated costs.

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CHAPTER - 1.: Project Background

1.1 Project Background

The Ministry of Road transport & Highways (MoRT&H) has been entrusted with the assignment of Consultancy Services for feasibility study and preparation of Detailed Project Report for improvement and up-gradation of in principle declared National Highways in the State of Uttar Pradesh.

M/s Chaitanya Projects Consultancy Pvt. Ltd. in Association with Agnitio Infrastructure Project Pvt. Ltd. has been appointed as Technical Consultants vide MoRT&H letter no. RO/LKO/DPR/I.P.NH/2016-17 dated 3rd January 2017 to carry out the Consultancy Services for feasibility study and preparation of Detailed Project Report for improvement and upgradation of in principle declared National Highways in the State of Uttar Pradesh.

1.2 Project Location

The project road starts from Lat 27013'10.93"N Long 79017'59.45"E and ends at Lat 28036 31.05"N and Long 79048'09.83"E.The Project road starts from T-Junction with NH- 92 near Bus stand at Bewar (District. – Mainpuri) and passes through Madanpur, Mohammdabad, Farrukhabad, Jalalabad, MiranpurKatra, Khudaganj, Bisalpur and ends at Pilibhit (Junction with NH 730). The project stretches from Bewar to Bisalpur via Farrukhabad, Jalalabad, MiranpurKatra, Khudaganj; Radhaita has been designated as National Highway No. 730 C and from Bisalpur to Pilibhit via Barkhra as National Highway No. 731K.




Figure 1-1: Key Map of the Project Road

1.3 Importance and Need of the project: -

The project road is part of old lepulekh-bhind road and after Up gradation it will connect Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh, Uttarakhand in India and Nepal via Gwalior – Etawah – Farukhabad- Pilibhit etc.

The project stretch starts from Bewar on NH-34, which is also a major economic corridor connecting Delhi, Aligarh, Bewar, Kanpur to Lucknow from east to west direction. All the towns are major industrial zones of Uttar Pradesh.

The project stretch crosses NH-30 at MiranpurKatra. NH-30 connects Delhi, Ghaziabad, Hapur, Bareilly, Sultanpur and Lucknow from east to west direction and all the towns are major economic / industrial hubs of Uttar Pradesh.

The project stretch terminates at NH-730 at Pilibhit, which connects Bareilly, Pilibhit, Lakhimpur-Khiri and Bahraich, the direction of NH-730 is also from east to west direction.

The road from Pilibhit to Khatima has been declared as NH-731K and connects at NH-09 at Khatima. The NH-09 connects Uttarakhand at Banbasa (AH-2). NH-09 also connects East-West Highway of Nepal (H01) via Banbasa & Bhimdatta in Nepal. The AH-2 via Rampur and Khatima connects NH-731K and Pithoragarh also in Uttarakhand.

The Farrukhabad is the largest potato and Shahjahanpur and Pilibhit is major sugarcane & rice producing area of country which is connected by this road

Sankissa is a major place for Buddhist pilgrims. Large numbers of foreign and Indian tourists are visited this place. The Sankissa is located 10 kilometers away from Mohamedabad on the project stretch.

It has to be noted that the project stretch is connecting three major roads i.e. NH-34, NH-30 and NH-730, all of them caters the traffic moving from east to west direction. There is no major connectivity that connects all the parallel roads in North-South direction.

1.3.1 Population of Influence Regions

The project will pass through 4 districts of Uttar Pradesh which has a total population of 1,99,81,2341, out of which Mainpuri-18,68,529, Farrukhabad-18,85,204, Shahjahanpur-30,06,538 and Pilibhit-20,31,007. Considering that these districts are major business centers, the project is expected to boost economic and industrial development of the area. The **table 1-1** represents the population of broadly influencing regions on the project road.

1.4 Need for Social Impact Assessment (SIA) and Resettlement Action Plan (RAP)

The proposed project passes through 4 districts and 10 nos. of Major Built-up / settlements. Proposed project will have adverse impact on land and structures. Total 9.8058 hectare of private land is required, apart from that 2664 structures will be affected which includes 1592 private structures and 76 of CPRs.

1.5 Scope and Objectives of Social Impact Assessment and Resettlement Action

SIA and RAP are project specific, which outlines the extent of impacts on communities due to the proposed development project and the mitigation of the potential impacts. It details necessary implementation procedures for rehabilitation and resettlement.

The SIA/RAP study is done for 183+380 km that start from T-Junction with NH- 92 near Bus stand at Bewar (District.–Mainpuri) and passes through Madanpur, Mohammdabad, Farrukhabad, Jalalabad, Miranpur Katra, Khudaganj, Bisalpur and ends at Pilibhit (Junction with NH 730).

The SIA study has been carried out with following objective:

- Ensuring social factors are considered in the decision-making process and in final design
- Ensuring that possible adverse social impacts are either avoided or minimized and brought to acceptable level
- More informed decision making by involving public since the beginning of project, informing the public about the proposal, allowing people to examine the underlying need for a project and giving them opportunity to identify problem and suggesting social friendly locally available solutions to the identified problem
- Improved integration of projects into their social setting
- A contribution towards achieving goal of sustainable development

The RAP is prepared to ensure that the affected persons are: (i) informed about their options and rights pertaining to resettlement; (ii) consulted, provided with technically and economically feasible resettlement alternatives and offered choices among them; (iii) provided prompt and effective compensation at full replacement cost for loss of assets

caused due to the project; (iv) provided R&R assistances (such as shifting allowance, transition allowance, etc.) during relocation and for a transition period, to restore their livelihood and standard of living; and, (v) provided with skill development assistance such as training, in addition to compensation. The objectives of RAP are: -

- To identify adverse impacts and determine mitigation measures;
- To present the entitlements and action plan for the affected persons for payment of compensation and assistance for restoring livelihoods, and improving or at least retaining the living standards in the post resettlement period.
- Facilitate the design of a monitoring programme to check the adequacy and implementation of mitigate measures.

1.6 Approach and Methodology:-

This report has been based largely on primary data collected during field survey and is well supported by a review of available secondary data for preparation of baseline information. The field research includes preliminary social survey of the project affected persons and properties within the proposed ROW. The methodology used for SIA study and preparation of RAP is discussed below:

• Census and Socio-economic survey: Census and socio-economic survey was conducted for each structure and properties covering owners and squatter (format of survey format attached as **Annexure 1.2**). This survey was conducted to assess the extent of impacts due to proposed upgrading of project road.

• Data Collection from Secondary Sources

Relevant baseline data on socio-economic were collected from available secondary sources, like census of India 2011, District Handbooks and respective government portals and website.

Stakeholder's Consultations

Consultations with potential project affected persons and local people were conducted to inform people about the proposed widening and improvement of the project road and also to understand perceptions and obtain their suggestions. Outcome of the consultations was shared with the design team of the consultant for integrating the social concerns wherever feasible. The main objective of consultations was to promote public understanding and find out meaningful solutions for issues related to local needs and problems, loss of livelihoods, impact on religious structures, alternatives, resettlement issues, etc.

CHAPTER - 2.: PROJECT DESCRIPTION

2.1 Project Profile

The project road starts from Lat 27013'10.93"N Long 79017'59.45"E and ends at Lat 28036 31.05"N and Long 79048'09.83"E.The Project road starts from T-Junction with NH- 92 near Bus stand at Bewar (District. – Mainpuri) and passes through Madanpur, Mohammdabad, Farrukhabad, Jalalabad, Miranpur Katra, Khudaganj, Bisalpur and ends at Pilibhit (Junction with NH 730). The project stretches from Bewar to Bisalpur via Farrukhabad, Jalalabad, Miranpur Katra, Khudaganj; Radhaita has been designated as National Highway No. 730 C and from Bisalpur to Pilibhit via Barkhra as National Highway No. 731K

Under this scheme, the consultancy work is awarded to M/s Chaitanya Projects Consultancy Pvt. Ltd. in Association with Agnitio Infrastructure Project Pvt. Ltd. for preparation of Detailed Project Report i.e. – Bewar –Miranpur Katra- Pilibhit. The existing length of project road is 183.650 km and design length is 183+380 km.

During discussion on Feasibility Report in MoRTH& Office of CE (NHPWD), it has been decided to break the project road in 4 packages. The breakup of packages is given below:




Figure 2-1: Key Map of the Project Road

2.2.2 Proposed Improvement

Design improvement in the project road is done taking into consideration the lane configuration, widening scheme, speed, embankment height and the urban or rural setting of the road. Improvements in the geometric design have been proposed in rural area to eliminate the substandard curvatures along the project road.

Design Speed

Design speed in general depends on the function of the road and terrain conditions and shall be as per schedule B Clause 2.2. The design speed shall be the minimum design speed of 100/80 km per hour for plain/rolling terrain. As per Clause 2.1, IRC SP: 73 - 2015, the design speeds adopted for various terrain classifications are presented in below table (Terrain is classified by the general slope of the ground across the highway alignment).

In general, the ruling design speed is adopted for the various geometric design features of the road. Minimum design speed is adopted where site conditions are restrictive and adequate land width is not available.

• Embankment Height

The embankment height shall be fixed in such a way that the difference between the elevation of top of sub grade and High Flood Level (HFL) is not less than 1.0m. Where there is no flooding observed, the existing road may be retained.

In many sections, the road top level is almost equal to the adjacent ground level or the embankment height is less than 0.5 m from adjoining ground. Some locations may need rising to address drainage problem. However the proposed FRL shall be designed in such a way that nowhere the edge of proposed roadway goes below the ground adjacent to toe of embankment slope. In this respect special care shall be taken at the locations of super elevated curves.

• Bypasses and Realignment in the Project Road

No Bypass and Realignment is proposed along the project road.

• Improvements in the Project Road

Improvements in 12 sections have been proposed of 6.122 Km length to improve horizontal alignment of the road geometry and for the safety of the road users. Details in Chainagewise are given below in **Table 2-5**.

• Space for Utility and Plantation

In general, the space for utility-cum-plantation shall be 2.0 m as per IRC guidelines.

Proposed Lane Configuration

Based on the traffic demand forecast and considering a Level of Service (LoS) "B" as the desired LoS, as recommended by IRC. It is apparent that the existing 2-lane roadway needs capacity augmentation to a roadway with 2-lane plus 1.5 m wide paved shoulder and 2m earthen shoulder on either side.

Apart from capacity increase, paved shoulders play a big role in roadway safety as well as protection of carriageway pavement. Therefore, the existing road is proposed for widening to 2 lane + 1.5 m paved shoulder and 2m earthen shoulder on either side.

The improvement proposal envisages widening of the existing road to standard two-lane carriageway having paved carriage shall be 10 m (7.0m CW/1.5m PS & 2m Earthen Shoulder on either side) in accordance with the typical cross section drawings.

2.2.9 Proposed Road Safety

Accident Locations: As per data collected from UP government in year 2018-19, no black spot has been identified in this section.

Safety: Proper safety precautions are recommended on roadway width, the safety items to be provided are –

- W Beam Crash Barrier/ Concrete Crash Barrier on either side of carriageway,
- Pavement Marking on Centre and edges lines,
- Provide adequate warning of hazards,
- Providing Bio-turfing for Slope protection,
- Retaining wall in approach of ROB
- Toe wall where embankment height is more than 3 m.

CHAPTER - 3.: Socio – Economic Profile of Project Influence Area

3.1 Introduction

The project influence area of the proposed road in Package-I, Package-II, Package-III and Package IV traverses in the districts of Mainpuri, Farrukhabad, Shahjahanpur, and Pilibhit in the state of Uttar Pradesh. The Direct Impact Zone are the census villages and towns which are likely to be impacted in terms of land acquisition, loss of assets, loss of livelihood etc., due to the project implementation. There are no social conflicts in particular land or water.

3.2 Overview of Uttar Pradesh

Uttar Pradesh is a state of northern India, with roughly 200 million inhabitants; it is the most populous state in India as well as the world. In terms of area It covers 240,928 km2 (93,023 sqmi), equal to 7.34% of the total area of India, and is the area. Though long known for sugar production, the state's economy is now dominated by the services industry. The service sector comprises travel and tourism, hotel, real estate, insurance and financial consultancies. The economy is the second-largest state economy in India with21.73 lakh crore (US\$300 billion) in product and a per capita GSDP of 95,000(US\$1,300).President's rule has been imposed in Uttar Pradesh ten times since 1968, for different reasons and for a total of 1,700 days. The state has currently two international airports, Chaudhary Charan Singh Airport(Lucknow) and Lal Bahadur Shastri Airport(Varanasi).Kanpur Central is the biggest railway station in Uttar Pradesh and one of the five Central railway stations in India. Allahabad is the headquarters of the North Central Railway and Gorakhpur Railway Station serves as the headquarters of the North Eastern Railway. The High Court of the state is located in Allahabad. (**Figure 3.1**).

The State has 75 administrative districts. More than three-fourth proportion of the total population is residing in rural areas. An overview of the State is presented below in **Table 3.1**:




Figure 3-1: Key map of Uttar Pradesh

The share of agriculture has been declining even then even then agriculture continues to play an integral part of the development process in the state as 77.73% of the population still live in villages and continue to depend on agriculture and allied activities as a prime source of their livelihood.

3.3 Project Influence Area (PIA)

The project influence area covers Mainpuri (Bewar City), Farrukhabad, Shahjahanpur and Pilibhit districts. The area with its sub-tropical climate has three very well-defined seasons summers, winters and monsoons. On the basis of climatic conditions and prevailing agricultural practices, the details of the districts are presented in **Table 3-2**:

3.4 Demographic Composition of the District

3.4.1 Population

As indicated before the project road of this package falls in the districts of Mainpuri, Farrukhabad, Shahjahanpur and Pilibhit in the state of Uttar Pradesh and it is expected that about 4.5% population of the State are likely to be directly or indirectly benefited by the implementation of the project as presented in **Annexure 3.1** (**Table 1**).

3.4.2 Population Density

Population density of the project influence districts varies considerably as per the census data of 2011. The percentage increase in the density of population of the project influenced area such as Mainpuri (16.93), Farrukhabad (20.00%), Shahjahanpur (19.96) and Pilibhit (20.31%), districts are smaller than that of the state (20.14%). as presented in **Annexure 3.1** (**Table 2**).

3.4.3 Rural and Urban Population

In the state of Uttar Pradesh, 77.73% of total population is rural and 22.27% is urban. The figures and facts as indicated in **Annexure 3.1** (**Table 3**) make it evident that the proposed road will pass through and cater to the needs of local population in the region.

3.4.4 Sex - ratio

Sex ratio of the influenced districts presents the slightly different scenario as that of state. The districts wise details reflected as shown in **Annexure 3.1** (**Table 4**).

3.4.5 Vulnerable Population

As per the Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement (LARR) Act 2013, people belonging to Scheduled Castes & Scheduled Tribes are to be considered as vulnerable population. The census data, 2011 reveals that the percentage of Scheduled Caste in the project influenced State/district is more than Schedule Tribe population, as summarized in **Annexure 3.1 (Table 5)**.

3.5 The Social Services

3.5.1 Literacy and Education

Literacy rate of the project influenced districts are higher than the state. Out of the impacted districts, Mainpuri has the highest literacy rate of 84.26%. It is also clear from the **Annexure 3.1** (**Table 6**). The literacy rate of Farrukhabad district is also higher than the state literacy rate.

3.6 Economic Features

3.6.1 Distribution of Population by Workers, Non-workers

The State of Uttar Pradesh presents a very different picture in terms of workforce where the people not only depend on agriculture but also are involved in other economic activities. However, the agriculture is the main occupation of its inhabitants in the project influenced districts as it is evident from **Annexure 3.1** (**Table 7**).

District wise breakup suggests that occupation in agricultural sector is greater than other sector in all two districts and constitutes more than 80% of the workers who are involved in agricultural and allied activities whereas the rest of them are involved in either HH industries or other kind of work as shown in **Annexure 3.1** (**Table 8**)

3.7 Social and Demographic Profile of the Affected Villages

Social assessment study essentially covers the socio-cultural and economic profile of people in the project influence area. The inhabitants are generally considered as the stakeholders of the project because project activities lead to direct and indirect or positive and negative impacts on the inhabitants and their resources.

Due to the implementation of project several villages or urban settlements in the affected districts of Mainpuri, Farrukhabad, Shahjahanpur and Pilibhit, are likely to be affected. On the basis of social survey those settlements and villages have been identified and the same has been documented in this chapter. The important demographic features of the villages, i.e., population, social categories, literacy level and economy of the villages are described as a part of baseline data(Annexure 3.2)

CHAPTER - 4.: Regulatory Framework and Entitlement Matrix

4.1 Introduction

The legal framework and principles adopted for addressing resettlement issues in the Project have been guided by the existing legislation and policies of the Government of India, the Government of India and World Bank's Safeguard Policy OP 4.12. Prior to the preparation of the Resettlement Action Plan, a detailed analysis of the existing national and state policies was undertaken and a resettlement framework has been prepared for the entire project. The resettlement framework is based on the review and analysis of all applicable legal and policy frameworks of the country and World Bank policy requirements.

4.2 Applicable National and State Policy Framework

Below section discusses the National and State policies that are applicable to this project.

4.2.1 The Scheduled Tribes and Other Traditional Forest Dwellers (Recognition of Forest Rights) Act, 2006

This is an act to recognize and vest the forest rights and occupation in forest land in forest dwelling scheduled tribes and other traditional forest dwellers who have been residing in such forests for generations but whose rights could not be recorded; to provide for a framework for recording the forest rights so vested and the nature of evidence required for such recognition and vesting in respect of forest land.

4.2.2 The Provision of Panchayat Extension to Scheduled Areas (PESA) Act

The 73rd and 74th Constitutional (Amendments of 1992), accommodate special powers to PRIs, were later extended, with separate provisions to the Scheduled Areas as well through the Panchayat (Extension to the Scheduled Areas) Act of 1996. With the strength and support of PESA Act, 1996 the PRI bodies at the district and village level have been endowed with special functional powers and responsibilities to ensure effective participation of the tribal people in their own development. This would also help preserve/ conserve their traditional rights over natural resources. A brief summary of powers given to PRIs under PESA Act is given below

- Listing of development projects for execution through Gram Panchayats.
- Identification and recommendation of beneficiaries under poverty alleviation programs.
- Any proposal/plan presented by the Gram Panchayat needs prior consultation and approval with the Gram Sabha
- Prior approval for collection of taxes
- Wherever necessary asking for information from gram Panchayat
- Intervene in conflict resolution through traditional and customary traditional methods if required
- Gram Sabha has power to safeguard the cultural identity, community resources and dispute resolution per traditional customs and regulations
- Control and supervision of functions and powers of Gram Panchayat

4.2.3 The Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013

The Right to Fair Compensation and Transparence in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013 has been effective from January1, 2014 after receiving the assent of the President of Republic of India. The Act replaced the Land Acquisition Act, 1894. The Act has since late December 2014 been amended to make it more flexible and the description of the amendment is described below.

The aims and objectives of the Act include is to ensure, in consultation with institutions of local self-government and Gram Sabhas established under the Constitution of India, a humane, participative, informed and transparent process for land acquisition for industrialization, development of essential infrastructural facilities and urbanization with the least disturbance to the owners of the land and other affected families. It provides for compensation and resettlement assistance to the affected families whose land or other assets are affected by the project. A few of key features that are revised from the old Act include the recognition of non-title holders to compensations if they have lived in the area proposed to be acquired in the past three years as well as compensations for loss of livelihood.

Section 26 of the Act defines the method by which market value of the land shall be computed under the proposed law. Schedule I outlines the proposed minimum compensation based on a multiple of market value. Schedule II to IV outline the resettlement and rehabilitation entitlements to land owners and livelihood losers, which shall be in addition to the minimum compensation per Schedule I.

4.2.4 The National Highway Act 1956

The National Highways Authority of India acquires land for a public purpose by invoking Section 3 (and its sub-sections) of the National Highways Act 1956. The Land Acquisition Act of 1894 does not apply when the National Highways Act 1956 is invoked. The NH Act 1956 provides for acquiring land through competent authority, which means any person or authority authorized by the Central Government by notification in the official Gazette to perform functions of the competent authority for such areas as may be specified in the notifications. Like the Land Acquisition Act, 1894, the National Highways Act, 1956, too does not provide for mitigation measures, but the Competent Authority under this Act determines the process and procedures of land acquisition.

For the purpose of land acquisition, the NH Act defines the various procedures as follows:

- Section 3A Intention of Central Government to acquire land
- 3B-power to enter for survey
- 3C-hearing of objections
- 3D-declaration of acquisition
- 3E-power to take possession,
- 3F-power to enter into the land where land has vested in the central government
- 3G-determination of compensation and
- 3H-deposit and payment of the amount.

The Act requires that the processes must be completed within a year from 3A to 3D. Although the NH Act significantly reduces the timeframe for acquisition, the rules and principles of compensation have been derived from the LARR Act of 2013.

As indicated before, the existing laws do not address many of the social and economic issues associated with displacement and resettlement, which will be addressed in this project with a project specific resettlement and rehabilitation policy framework. The process of land acquisition as per MoRTH circular dated 28 December 2017 (Annexure 4.1).

4.2.5 OP/BP 4.12 -INVOLUNTARY RESETTLEMENT

The World Bank's Operational Directive OD 4.30 (June 1990), which remained the Bank's policy statement on R&R all these years, was replaced by Operational Policy (OP) and Bank Procedure (BP) 4.12 (December 2001) put together. This OP and BP applied to all projects for which a Project Concept Review takes place on or after January 1, 2002. The important clauses of the World Bank Policy in preparation of resettlement plan and policy framework includes the following:

- Ensure that the displaced persons are informed about their options and rights pertaining to resettlement;
- Consulted on, offered choices among, and provided with technically and economically feasible resettlement alternatives;
- Prompt and effective compensation at full replacement cost for losses of assets;
- Provide assistance and allowances:
- Provide equivalent productive assets for the loss of residential house, agricultural land etc.;
- Provide support for the transition period (between displacement and livelihood restoration);
- Provide land related development assistance (credit facilities, training and job opportunities);
- Preference should be given to land based resettlement strategies for displaced persons whose livelihoods are land-based;
- Cash compensation level should be sufficient to replace the lost land and assets at full replacement cost in local markets;
- Eligibility of Benefits should include the PAPs who have formal legal rights to land (including customary and traditional land rights recognised under law), the PAPs who do not have formal legal rights to land at the time of census but have a claim to such land or assets and the PAPs who have no recognisable legal right to the land they are occupying;
- Particular attention will be paid to the needs of vulnerable groups among those displaced, especially those below the poverty line, landless, elderly, women and children, ethnic minorities etc;
- The displaced persons and their communities will be provided timely and relevant information, consulted on resettlement options, and offered opportunities to participate in planning, implementing, and monitoring resettlement. Appropriate and accessible grievance mechanisms will be established for these groups

In addition to the above core measures, the bank's policy also emphasizes the need for a detailed resettlement policy inclusive of all the above points; a project specific resettlement plan, an institutional framework for implementation, well developed monitoring and evaluation mechanisms, a time schedule for implementation, and a detailed financial plan.

4.2.6 OP/BP 4.10 -INDIGENOUS PEOPLE

The OP / OP 4.12 for involuntary resettlement, is applicable to indigenous peoples. Hence; there is no impact on indigenous people the OP4.10 is not applicable for this project.OP/BP 4.10 directive provides policy guidance to

- ensure that indigenous people benefit from development projects, and
- avoid or mitigate potentially adverse effects on indigenous people, tribes, ethnic minorities, or other groups. It provides directives for preparation of indigenous people development plan (IPDP). The pre requisite for successful IPDP includes:
- Prepare a plan based on people's choice;
- Avoid or mitigate adverse trends;
- Development activities adaptable to the needs and environment of indigenous people; and,
- Encourage early hand over of project management to local people

4.3 Resettlement Framework Principles and Entitlement Matrix

Based on the above analysis of government provisions, the following key resettlement principles, definitions and Entitlement Matrix have been adopted for the Project.

A. Key Resettlement Principles

- (i) land acquisition, and other involuntary resettlement impacts will be avoided or minimized exploring all viable alternative sub-project designs;
- (ii) where unavoidable, time-bound resettlement plans (RAPs) will be prepared and APs will be assisted in improving or at least regaining their pre-program standard of living:
- (iii) consultation with APs on compensation, disclosure of resettlement information to APs, and participation of APs in planning and implementing sub-projects will be ensured;
- (iv) vulnerable and severely affected households will be provided special assistance:
- (v) payment of compensation to APs including non-titled persons (e.g., informal dwellers/squatters, and encroachers) for acquired assets at replacement rates;
- (vi) payment of compensation and resettlement assistance prior to the contractor taking physical acquisition of the land and prior to the commencement of any construction activities;
- (vii) provision of income restoration and rehabilitation;
- (viii) Establishment of appropriate grievance redress mechanisms.

B. Key Working Definitions

Cut-off dates: For Titleholders, the date of notification under Section 3(A) of the NH Act 1956 will be treated as the cut-off date, for non-titleholders such as squatters; the cut-off date will be the start date of the project census survey as per the final detailed design or updated census survey during RP implementation.

Vulnerable Affected Households: Vulnerable Households are defined as affected families who are: (i) below the national poverty level; (ii) headed by women and below the average income of affected households; (iii) headed by disabled or elderly and below the average income of affected households; (iv) scheduled tribes and marginalized scheduled castes.

C. Entitlement Matrix

All persons affected by the project and meeting the cut-off date requirements will be entitled to a combination of compensation packages and resettlement assistance depending on the nature of ownership rights on lost assets and scope of the impacts:

- a. Compensation for the loss of land ,crops/trees at their replacement cost;
- b. Compensation for structures (residential/ commercial) and other immovable assets at their replacement cost;
- c. Assistance in lieu of the loss of business/ wage income and income restoration assistance:
- d. Assistance for shifting and provision for the relocation site (if required), and
- e. Rebuilding and/ or restoration of community resources/facilities
- f. Additional Support to Vulnerable Families

An **Entitlement Matrix**, delineated in **Table 4.1** has been developed to summarize entitlements.

CHAPTER - 5.: PUBLIC INFORMATION AND CONSULTATIONS

5.1 Introduction

Project affected people were informed about the proposed road development and potential impacts during consultations. The stakeholder's consultation has been carried out in this Project with the objectives of minimizing probable adverse impacts of the project through alternate design solutions (cross-sectional) and to achieve speedy implementation of the project through bringing in awareness among the community on the benefits of the project.

Public consultation has been taken up as an integral part of social assessment process of the Project. Public consultation has been viewed as a continuous two way process, involving promotion of public understanding of the processes and mechanisms through which developmental problems and needs are investigated and solved. Consultation was used as a tool to inform and educate stakeholders about the proposed action both before and after the development decisions were made. It assisted in identification of the problems associated with the project as well as the needs of the population to be impacted. This participatory process helped in reducing the public resistance to change and enabled the participation of the local people in the decision making process. The involvement of affected people and other stakeholders have been ensured in this project with the objectives of minimizing probable adverse impacts of the project through alternate design solutions (alignment and cross-sectional) and to achieve speedy implementation of the project through bringing in awareness among the community on the benefits of the project. Several meetings were organized at various locations, promoting public understanding of the processes and mechanisms through which developmental problems and needs are investigated and resolved.

Extensive public consultations were carried out with various stakeholders at various locations throughout the length of the project road corridor. Consultations were undertaken with project affected persons (PAPs), and meetings conducted with district authorities, revenue officials, village panchayats and public representatives in selected villages/towns. A total of278Community Member including 265 male and 13 female participated. The consultation methods are summarized in **Table 5.1**.

5.2 Classification of Stakeholders

Stakeholder analysis typically classifies stakeholders or all those who have an interest in the project, into three categories:

- Primary stakeholders are those who are directly or indirectly affected by a project, such as the project beneficiaries and the people who are likely to be adversely affected by a project.
- Secondary stakeholders are those who are involved in the delivery of the project outputs, such as the government, the *implementing* agency, the executing agency (e.g., contractors, consultants), if any and NGOs, etc.
- External stakeholders are those who are "outside" the ambit of the project activities, but who can influence the outcome of the project, such as the media, politicians, religious leaders and other opinion leaders.

For this project, affected people, influential person, village sarpanch and panchayat members, members of the affected villages, local women were considered as Primary stakeholders.

5.3 Consultation Process

The process of stakeholder consultation included:

- Identification of the relevant stakeholders including all those individuals, groups and organizations potentially affected by or interested in the project;
- Pre informing the stakeholders about the consultation dates and location;
- During the consultation process, imparting information about the project interventions and its potential impacts;
- Recording of their concerns and aspirations through discussions;
- Responding to their queries in a neutral manner.

5.4 Stakeholder's consultation

Public consultations meetings were conducted in project corridor villages at 24 locations as part of the SIA & RAP. Majority of the stakeholders expressed their full support for the widening and improvement of the proposed project road with suitable compensation. They agreed that proposed project will have both positive and adverse impact on the community and assets, especially those who are along the project road. But at the same time, they were aware that road development will also improve the connectivity of the villages to the major district headquarters. They anticipated construction activities will generate employment opportunities for the local people. During public consultation, it was informed that proposed project will have impacts on residential and commercial structures as well as religious and community structures, along the road. Details of number and type of consultation conducted along the road are presented in **Table 5-2**and the photographs and list of participants is given in **Annexure 5.1 and 5.2**respectively.

5.4.1 Public Consultations

Consultations were carried out with community affected on the project road to get their views and suggestions regarding the proposed project. Local people were very interested and showed their support for proposed project and were also expressive about their concerns regarding payment of compensation for assets attached to land and timely completion of the project. The details of the consultation are given in **Table 5-2.**

Major recommendations and outcome of the consultation

- Saving of the structures is the major concern along the project road.
- Religious structures will be affected in proposed project; therefore, it should be avoided.
- The land owners expecting compensation as per market value.
- Expecting employment opportunities from the project.
- Villager's advice to engage/employment of local people during the construction.
- Measures to improve the water availability of the area; and Contribute towards developmental activities of the area.
- The people expressed concerns over movement of heavy traffic, as their children are not safe to cross the road.
- The Gram Panchayats/ Chairman Municipality consulted was observed to be supportive of the project. They felt that the proposed project can bring development in the area and they demanded greater engagement of local community as well as to avoid structures whereas possible.

5.5 Consultations with Land Owner

Consultations were carried out with affected land owners to get their views and suggestions regarding proposed project. Most of the land owner were very interested and showed their support for proposed project but also expressed their concern regarding payment of compensation and timely completion of the project. The detail of the consultation is given in **Table5-2.**

CHAPTER - 6.: Analysis of Alternatives

This chapter details the various alternatives considered to decide on the feasibility of the project and in design finalization. The analysis has been done at two levels, firstly, the alternative analysis was done considering the "with and without project scenarios" which considered the potential social impacts, both positive and negative, of the project. Secondly, an analysis has also been made during finalization of bypasses and realignments taking into consideration the requirement in meeting the design standards for smooth flow of traffic and also social impact of the opted designs on assets and requirements of land along the road, bypasses and realignments. Both the analysis is detailed in the below section:

6.1 Inputs at Different Stages for Minimizing Resettlement

Regarding resettlement and rehabilitation input, it may be mentioned here that from the very beginning of the project formation, social and environmental team worked hand to hand with engineering design group. These inputs in concrete terms were made available at the following stages:

- a) **Stage 1:** Potential resettlement and rehabilitation issues were identified at the preliminary reconnaissance visit. Field Surveyors identified the villages and urban areas with inadequate road width and design team was provided this input.
- b) Stage 2: Right of way was ascertained from Uttar Pradesh PWD and Revenue Department and where in doubt, actual measurements were made and data on land available for road widening and the land acquisition requirement was collected and provided to the Design team. The socio-economic and census surveys of the potentially project affected persons were initiated from the very beginning. A Social Assessment was done of the 100% potentially affected population within the likely corridor of impact (30 meters). The social assessment registered the household members and individuals within the potential corridor of impact, enumerated the sites and in fact gathered sufficient demographic and social information to determine whether they were to be categorized as vulnerable groups with special entitlements under the project as per Entitlement Matrix. Socio-economic survey provided the base line against which mitigation measures and support has been measured and survey included the needs and resources of different groups and individuals including women headed households and gender analysis.
- c) **Stage 3:** R & R team working in the field, weighed up the alternative alignment options proposed by the Survey and Engineering team and this field information were shared and discussed with engineering design team, so that they make such a plan, which could avoid or minimize adverse impact on large number of households. In response, the engineering team considered various options.
- d) **Stage 4:** Local level consultation regarding the impact of widening of the road through the villages and towns was conducted and alternative suggestions offered by them were considered. Social and environmental inputs were provided at the feasibility stage and recommendations were made according to the findings of the social and environmental surveys.
- e) **Stage 5**: Full coordination and cooperation between the resettlement and Rehabilitation team and Engineering team results in:
 - a) Unnecessary displacement avoided by modifying the alignment
 - b) Fixing the speed in the built-up areas including schools and hospitals as per local needs and problems of the people
 - c) Deciding the rural and urban road cross-sections based on field surveys and likely impact on the people

d) Evolving Community consensus on shifting the existing shrines and religious structures

6.1.1 Design Consideration

The project road generally runs in plain terrain in the state of Uttar Pradesh. As per IRC design manual for 2 lanes, 30m in widening of existing road to 2 lane with paved shoulder has been proposed. At isolated locations like junctions, rest areas, high embankments, entry and exit location of service road etc. the safety aspects to be considered for the proposed designs.

The design criteria, method applied for important components of the project are as follows:

Geometric Design: IRC Standards and MoRT&H Manuals as well as circulars on National Highways supplemented by AASHTO policy on geometric design.

New Pavement: IRC Standards and MoRTH Manuals as well as circulars on National Highways supplemented by AASHTO policy on geometric design. New Pavement - IRC 37-2018 and AASHTO Design guide, for design of flexible pavements - IRC 58-2015 for design of rigid **pavements**.

Structure Design: Bridge Codes as mentioned in QAP Road Furniture & Related standards of IRC &MoRTH publications Road side Facilities Besides the above, standards and specifications mentioned in IRC: SP: 73-2015 shall be followed strictly wherever applicable

Based on the outcome of the surveys/investigations, design considerations, Road safety audit, social and environment screening of the existing section, the improvement plan for The improvement/up-gradation proposals of Existing Road to two lane Paved shoulder include the provisions Geometric Improvements, realignments, widening proposals and reconstruction, Grade separators, Pavement, Road Junctions, Bridges and Cross-Drainages, Special Problems and Road Appurtenances. In some cases new alignments (bypass) and realignments may also be required. The adopted cross sectional elements as per the design standards and salient features of the project are presented in the **table 6-1.**

CHAPTER - 7.: Land Acquisition and Project Impact

7.1 Introduction

Socio-economic profile of the project affected households has been worked out on the basis of Census & Socio-economic survey conducted for land, structures and other properties likely to be affected. Census survey establishes that 1242 Nos. structures including 1166 private structures, in which 170 structures are squatters and they are on government land and 76 CPRs (33 government structures and 43 religious structures) will be affected in the project. A total of 162 vulnerable families (129 rural artisan&_33_squatters) are getting affected.

Out of 1166 private structures getting affected 996 belong to Titleholders and 170 to Non-title holders., all non-titleholders are having temporary type of structures, Out of 1166 structures, 106 residential, 1006 commercial and 54 are residential cum commercial. The number of project affected populations (PAPs) is 8162 which include male is 55% and 45% female.

About land acquisition of 9.8058 hectare with impact on 78 plots, out of which 63 plots were Private and 15 were Government Plot covered in census survey. Census survey reveals that 63 plots having 202 households which are altogether 1414 persons (family members of affected households). 1414 family were affected from 63 Private plots. The detail of land acquisition is shown in **Annexure 7.1** and details on land acquisition and resettlement impacts is shown in **Annexure 7.3**.

7.2 Project Impact

The project impact which includes impact on land, structures and CPRs likely to be affected, are presented in the **Table 7-1**.

7.2.2 Impact on land

Proposed project required total of 551.11-hectare land out of which 541.3 (98.22%) hectare land is available (Existing RoW) and 9.8058 hectare of land will be acquired which includes 9.2706 (1.68%) hectare of private, 0.5352 (0.10%) of government land will be acquired. A detail of the land acquisition is presented in **Table 7-2.**

7.2.3 Impacts on Structures

As per the Census survey, a total of 1242 structures will be impacted due to project activities. Out of 1242structures include 1166 are private structures, out of 1166 private structures include170 structures are squatters and they are on government land and 76 CPRS (43 are religious structures and 33 are government structures).

It was found that many households have a small shrine (Tree Temple) in front of their house or in their fields for worshipping as per their traditional beliefs. These shrines are called as "Tree Temple" in local language. About 11 such shrines (Tree Temple) will be impacted due to road widening. Relocation of these shrines was discussed with the affected households during census survey. People agreed to relocate these shrines if compensation is paid for their relocation and reconstruction.

In case of schools, mostly the boundary wall of the schools will be impacted and there would not be much impact on the main building. The **table 7-4** gives categories of various structures likely to get affected. The census and socio-economic list of likely affected PAP's are given in **Annexure 7.2**.

7.3 Socio Economic Profile of Project Affected Households

Census and Socio-Economic survey has been carried out for 1166 affected households losing structures. There are altogether 8162 persons (family members of affected households). Out of the 8162 PAPs, 55% are male and 45% are female. The socio-economic profile of the affected structures households is analyzed and presented in the following sections.

Majority of the PAHs belongs to Hindu population (60%) followed by Muslim population of 40%. It is also found that majority of the families are nuclear families i.e,758 (65%) and remaining 408 (35%) of the affected households are joint families.

Out of the 1166 PAFs, 824 belong to General Category, 312 are Other Backward Castes (OBC), 30 are SC, and no ST household impacted due to the project.

The social development of a region is signified by many indices. One of which is literacy status of the population. The literacy rate (read, write and understand) in the affected households is around 30%. Among the literate households has achieved up to upper primary level of education and secondary, senior secondary, graduate and post graduate education is comprises 2%.

As per the information collected during the census survey, it is found that the educational level of the area reveals that overall scenario of education level is not encouraged among the surveyed HHs as less significant percentage of population i.e. about 2 % and 6% have completed graduate and postgraduate respectively. The details are given in **Table 7-6 below:**

7.3.1 Economic Profile

The occupation pattern shows that primarily affected households are engaged in Business sector comprising of 65% of the total PAHs. This is followed by 25% engaged in Agriculture, 3% are daily wage earners,2% are serviceman and only 5% of the total workers are self-employed. Details of the occupation of the project affected families are given in **(Table 7-7)**.

The level of household income among the HHs within the RoW **(Table 7-7)**illustrate that an overwhelming majority of 55%, have an income level between Rs.60000 and Rs. 120000 per year followed by 30% of HHs earning more than 120000 per year and 15% of HHs earning up to 60000/year. The proposed improvement will considerably reduce the travel time between the Pilibhit-Bewar. This will facilitate growth of more economic activities, access to better economic prospect outside the area and hence increase of income opportunities.

7.3.2 Vulnerable Group

Vulnerable families constitute that portion of the population which is denied the opportunity to fully explore and utilize its abilities and thus enjoy a quality of life. These people are left behind in today's advancing economy and need special attention and care. Thus below poverty line (BPL), women headed household (WHH), schedule caste (SC), schedule tribes (ST), divyang (disabled) are considered in vulnerable groups.

A total of162 vulnerable families(129 rural artisan&_33 squatters) will be affected which includes 40.74 % of SC category followed by 40% BPL, 19% Women Headed households and 1 % divyang(disabled) and 0% of ST. The Entitlement matrix for this project has specific provisions for vulnerable group and additional assistance will be provided to the households belonging to vulnerable category. The details of the vulnerable category are given in **Table 7-8**.

7.4 Conclusion

The census survey analysis of the project affected persons reveals their dependency on the project corridor. This dependency is either in the form of place for residence, for livelihood generation or for transportation. Affected people shall be consulted at every stage of the project planning and implementation. Their worries and suggestions shall be taken into account and the negative impacts shall be mitigated. The social impact management

Resettlement Action Plan Report for Rehabilitation and up gradation of Bewar-Pilibhit Section (km 0.000 to km 183.380) of NH 730 C (Package I, II, III) and 731 K(Package IV) State of Uttar Pradesh measures shall be implemented during the various stages of the project viz. Pre-construction Stage, Construction Stage and Operational Stage.

CHAPTER - 8.: Gender analysis

8.1 Introduction

Though the project study does not identify any particular direct adverse impacts to women under the project, however the project during implementation and the operation phases would identify any issues for being adopted to enhance the quality life of the women living along the project corridor.

8.2 Women's Participation in the Project

The Gender Development Index (GDI) value for India is very low and the socio-economic profile of the project area shows much lower socio-economic standing for women. They are largely involved in domestic, agricultural work and have very low economic participation rate (i.e. productive or gainful employment). In the project area, mostly women are housewives and they might face hardship, stress and continue to suffer during the transition period of the project. Often, the duration of this process is lengthened due to delays in payment of compensation, rehabilitation assistance and implementation of the R&R., reconstructing and placement of the livelihood systems. The longer the transition period, more are the sufferings to the women.

8.3 Potential Project Impacts on Women

The status of women in project districts as compared to men is marginalized. Women are dependent on male members of the households. Households headed by women do not enjoy similar status as their counterpart. The project influence area is a male dominated society and women have very less role to play. Marginalization of women was observed during census and socio-economic survey and public consultation meetings. Only in the absence of male members of the household women members responded to surveys and in public consultation meetings women present in the meeting maintained low profile excepting a few places. Group consultations with women also did not bring out specific concerns except for compensation and financial help from government, and possibility of increased number of accidents, etc. Similarly, it was also pointed out that upgrading of project road will facilitate access to health and education facilities for women and girl child.

8.4 Women Headed Household

Female-headed households are considered a vulnerable group as per this SIA. The resettlement plan ensures that socio-economic conditions, needs and priorities of women in the affected area are identified and the process of land acquisition and resettlement does not disadvantage women. Focus groups discussions have been conducted with women along the project areas to address their specific women's issues. During disbursement of compensation and provision of assistance priority will be given to female-headed households.

However, as per findings of the census survey of affected structures, it was found that,31 women headed households along the proposed project area are losing their structures. The photographs of women headed households are given below:

8.5 Consultation with Women

Focus group discussions were conducted with women group to take their suggestions and concerns related to the implementation of this project. It was noted during the discussions that women in the study area consistently lagging behind in terms of access to education, health care, jobs etc.

During consultation with women group, issues related to safety of their children, resettlement of their residential as well as commercial structure, gender-based benefits and constraints of the project, were discussed. As many households do not have tap water facility in the area, so women and girls need to cross the road to fetch water as many a times the water resources are on the other side of the road. Safety of children is also a concern considering the increase in the number of vehicles due to better road connectivity. Cattle also cross the road and there are issues related to their safety as well. They suggested avoiding demolition of the structure because they have been settled there from a long time and proposed considering bypasses to avoid any impact on the settlements.

During consultation it was also recorded that no one complained about any gender-based violence issue.

In general, women welcomed the road project as it will help the villagers to easily avail the medical facility near Bewar Town, and Wahidpur near Farrukhabad town. Mostly girls drop their education after 10th and 12th due to unavailability of the colleges near the village/town. With better connectivity, the women group anticipated that more girls will avail better educational and health facilities. The details of Focus Group Discussions/ consultations are given in **table 8-1**and list of participants is given in **5.2**.

CHAPTER - 9.: RESETTLEMENT BUDGET

9.1 Introduction

Compensation for Land and R&R

Land will be acquired under NH Act but compensation and assistance will be paid as per the entitlements given in RPF. The entitlements are based on the provisions of Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013 and while determining the compensation for land, the competent authority will be guided by the provisions of Sec 26, Sec 27, Sec 28, Sec 29 and Sec 30 of RFCTLARR Act, 2013. The compensation includes, the multiplying factor of 1.25-2.00 times on the land value being the higher of the guideline value or average of higher 50% of sale deed rates for the preceding 3 years or any rates consented for PPP or private projects. In addition, 100% solatium will be added. Following are the criteria in assessing and determining the market value of the land: Higher of

- i) market value as per Indian Stamp Act, 1899 for the registration of sale deed or agreements to sell, in the area where land is situated; or
- ii) average sale price for similar type of land, situated in the nearest village or nearest vicinity area ascertained from the highest 50% of sale deeds of the preceding 3 years; or
- iii) Consented amount paid for PPPs or private companies.

The market value in Rural areas shall be multiplied by a factor as notified by Government of Revenue (GoR) Plus 100% solatium and 12% additional on basic market value from date of 3A notification to award. Title holders, whose land is severed, will have the option of surrendering the severed portion of the remaining unviable land.

Religious/community/government assets amounts have been determined as per the Land and Structure Circle rates collected from Stamp and Registration department, Uttar Pradesh.

The total R&R estimated budget is approximate **Rs.63.42 Crores** and the detailed Land and Structure value will be assessed during the project implementation.

CHAPTER - 10.: INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENT FOR RAP IMPLEMENTATION

Institutional arrangements for the implementation of RAP have been made fixed by making it a part of the RPF. The Institutional Arrangements will be set up at three levels viz., MoRT&H (Central Govt.), State Level and Sub-Project Level on partnership model wherein concerned agencies at different levels supplement and complement each other efforts. The key elements of institutional arrangements are co-operation/ support, collaboration and sharing of responsibilities with clearly defined roles, involvement of key stakeholders and vertical and horizontal linkages amongst different agencies. The institutional arrangement is discussed below and depicted in **Figure 10.1**




Figure 10-1: Institutional Arrangement for RAP Implementation

10.1 Central Level

At Central Level, the Chief Engineer (EAP), MoRT&H, Govt. of India will be overall responsible for the implementation of RAP. Chief Engineer (EAP) will have all delegated administrative and financial decisions with regard to implementation of the project as well as land acquisition and RAP implementation. It will include further augmenting the capacity of MoRT&H with regard to resettlement and rehabilitation and management of other social issues. CE (EAP) will be assisted by a team comprising EE designated as Social Officer and a suitable number of technical and secretarial staff. MORT&H also will engage a Social Development Specialist (SDS) either as individual consultant or through Project Management Consultant (PMC), to work with EAP and assist Social Officer. The EAP will be responsible for ensuring training, guidance, and recommendations for handling policy and implementation issues at the state and sub-project levels in compliance with RPF. The Social Development Specialist either individually or with PMC will provide policy and strategic assistance to EAP on social issues including land acquisition and rehabilitation and resettlement. The designated Social Officer will be specifically responsible for implementation of RAP. The Social Officer will ensure that all social safeguards issues are complied with as per the RPF. The roles and responsibilities of the SDS would broadly include the following:

Institutional arrangement at Central Level will include augmenting the capacity of MoRT&H with regard to resettlement and rehabilitation. A team comprising Executive Engineer designated as Social Development Specialist (SDS) and a suitable number of Technical and Secretarial Staff will assist CE (EAP). The designated SDS will be directly involved in the implementation of RAP. The SDS will ensure that all resettlement and rehabilitation issues are complied with as per the RPF. The roles and responsibilities of the SDS would broadly include the following:

- Ensure preparation and disclosure of SIA, RAP and Land Acquisition Plan for sub projects as per RPF.
- Ensure adequate staffing at state and sub project level to ensure timely implementation of RAP.
- Guide and supervise in matters related to resettlement and rehabilitation to state and sub-project level offices.
- Compile data related to resettlement and rehabilitation activities received from field offices and update Chief Engineer (CE) and suggest suitable measures to be taken.
- Interact with implementation agencies at state and sub-project level on a regular basis.
- Undertake field visits as and when required.
- Facilitate necessary help needed at site with regard to LA and R&R issues.
- Co-ordinate with state government department in matters related to implementation of R&R.
- Ensure budgetary provision for resettlement and rehabilitation of PAPs and relocation, rehabilitation and reconstruction of common property resources (CPRs).
- Ensure timely release of budget for implementation of RAP.
- Monitor implementation of RAP carried out by the agency through RRO at subproject level
- Perform other roles and responsibilities related to implementation of RAP as assigned by the CE (EAP) from time to time.
- Ensure free, prior and informed consultation with vulnerable groups along the project and also ensure that sufficient supporting documentation is maintained.
- Ensure third party audit of RAP implementation.

10.2 State Level

At State Level, a Land Acquisition cum Social Development Officer will be appointed in the Project Coordination Unit (PCU) headed by Nodal officer. Additional sociologist as individual consultant will also be engaged to assist LA cum SDO in states as required, particularly in states with larger share of sub projects in Uttar Pradesh. The roles and responsibilities of the LA cum SDO would broadly include the following:

- Facilitate preparation and implementation of land acquisition and RAP in compliance with RPF,
- Ensure consultation and stakeholder participation in finalization of RAP,
- Guide and supervise RAP implementation at sub-project level,
- Interact with RAP implementation support agencies and undertake field visits for firsthand information,
- Guide and supervise the RAP implementing agency to roll out HIV prevention activities.
- Compile data on LA progress and RAP implementation activities received from field offices and update EAP, MoRT&H and suggest suitable measures to be taken,
- Co-ordinate with various government departments in matters related to implementation of RAP,
- Check implementation of RAP carried out by the agency from time to time by undertaking site visits and consultations with PAPs,
- Perform other roles and responsibilities related to implementation of RAP as assigned by the EAP, MoRT&H from time to time,
- Facilitate and cooperate in Third party Audit of RAP implementation.
- Ensure a well-functioning GRM including "confidential" handling of complaints relating to Gender Based Violence.

10.3 Sub-Project Level

A Project Implementation Unit (PIU) comprising officials of State PWD will be constituted at sub- project level and headed by the Superintending Engineer/ Executive Engineer who will be designated as Project Director. The PIU will be responsible for the project execution including RAP implementation. There will be a designated or appointed Resettlement & Rehabilitation Officer (RRO) at respective PIUs who will be responsible only for the implementation of RAP at site. Additional sociologist as individual consultant will also be engaged to assist RRO as required. RRO will assist Project Director at PIU in all matters related to resettlement and rehabilitation. The roles and responsibilities of the Resettlement and Rehabilitation Officer are as under:

- Ensure RAP implementation with assistance from implementation agency as per the time line agreed upon.
- Interact with RAP implementation agency on a regular basis.
- Undertake field visits with implementation agency from time to time.
- Co-ordinate with district administration and other departments in matters related to implementation of R&R.
- Facilitate necessary help needed at site with regard to LA and R&R, HIV issues to implementation agency.
- Ensure distribution of Resettlement and Rehabilitation Policy and entitlement matrix for the project to PAPs.
- Ensure preparation and distribution of photo identity cards.

- Ensure and attend meetings organized by implementation agency on thematic areas related to resettlement and rehabilitation policy and entitlements and awareness generation including aspects relating to GBV.
- Ensure inclusion of PAPs who could not be enumerated during census but have documentary evidence to be included in the list of PAPs.
- Ensure preparation of identity cards, and approval from the PCU and distribution of the same to PAPs.
- Ensure timely preparation of micro-plan from RAP implementation agency and approval from PCU.
- Ensure disbursement of resettlement and rehabilitation assistance in a transparent manner.
- Participate in meetings related to resettlement and rehabilitation issues.
- Facilitate in opening of joint account of PAPs.
- Ensure release of compensation and assistance before taking over the possession of land for start of construction work.
- Ensure relocation, rehabilitation and reconstruction of CPRs before dismantling through proper mechanism.
- Ensure development of resettlement sites, where required.
- Attend and participate in Grievance Redress Committee meetings for redressal of grievances of PAPs and other committees involving R&R matters,
- Liaison with government and other agencies for inclusion of PAPs in employment and income generation programme/scheme.
- Ensure that tribal families get equal opportunity to participate during implementation and become overall beneficiaries in the project.
- Prepare monthly progress report related to physical and financial progress of implementation of RAP and submit to PCU.
- Provide all necessary information and data related to R&R on monthly basis to designated Social Officer at Central Level through Project Director.
- Carry out any other work related to resettlement and rehabilitation that may be entrusted from time to time by the PCU for compliance of R&R.

Besides, other institutional arrangements required for the implementation of RAP include engagement of RAP IA for the implementation of RAP, formation of District level committee to fix the replacement cost of affected properties, Grievance redressal mechanism, Suggestion and Complaint handling mechanism, engagement of monitoring and evaluation agency, etc. Roles and responsibilities of each agency are discussed below.

10.4 RAP Implementation Support Agency

The Project Authority [CE (EAP), MoRT&H: To implement RAP for each of the sub-project, will engage the services of **NGOs/Consultancy firms** having experience in resettlement and rehabilitation issues. Broad roles and responsibilities of implementation agency would be as:

- The RAP implementation agency will be the main link between the Project Authority and PAPs,
- Shall be responsible for verification of PAPs as prepared by the DPR consultants,
- Undertake public information campaign along with RRO at the commencement of the RAP.
- Develop rapport with PAPs,

- Distribute pamphlets of R&R Policy including Entitlement Matrix to PAPs,
 Panchayat Rai Institutions, and concerned Govt. Offices in the project area, etc.
- Include PAPs who could not be enumerated during census cum socio-economic survey and certification from R&R Officer,
- Distribute identity cards for PAPs,
- Prepare and submit micro-plan to RRO for approval from PCU,
- Organize consultations at regular interval with PAPs with regard to resettlement and rehabilitation,
- Organize training program for skill up gradation of the PAPs,
- Assist PAPs in all matters related to compensation and R&R,
- Assist and facilitate aggrieved PAPs (for compensation and assistance) by bringing their cases to GRC,
- Facilitate in opening of joint account of PAPs,
- Generate awareness about the alternative economic livelihood and enable PAPs to make informed choice,
- Consultations with PAPs regarding the choice of resettlement (i.e. self or assisted), development of resettlement site, participation of women, etc.
- Identify training needs of PAPs for income generation and institutions for imparting training,
- Undertake outreach activities for HIV prevention for awareness and behaviour change as per RAP,
- Hold consultations with local people and Panchayat Raj Institutions with regard to relocation, rehabilitation, reconstruction of affected CPRs as well as provision of new facilities under the project,
- Participate in various meetings relating to RAP preparation and implementation,
- Submit monthly progress report, and
- Undertake any other activities that may be required for the implementation of RAP, etc.

10.5 Replacement Cost Committee at District Level

A committee at district level will be constituted to fix the replacement cost of land in case of lands acquired through Direct Purchase method or Land lease, structures and other properties (trees, crops and other assets, tube well, hand pump, etc). The committee may be chaired by the District Collector/ Dy. Commissioner or his designated representative (not below the rank of SDM), Project Director-cum-Executive Engineer of the concerned PIU, District Agriculture Officer, Range Officer (Forest Department, if required), an independent certified valuer, Executive Engineer of the concerned District, elected representative (MLA) of the concerned area and Team Leader of RAP implementation agency.

The highest value of land obtained by the three methods mentioned in Section 26 and Schedule 1 of RFCTLARR 2013 will be presented by the Project Authority and approved by the committee as the replacement cost. Similarly, latest schedule of rates of the concerned districts shall be used for obtaining replacement cost of structures. For items not available in the schedule of rates, for those items market rates shall be collected from three different sources and then replacement cost shall be fixed by the committee. For replacement costs of crops, trees and other such items similar methods will be followed.

For titleholders the difference of replacement amount and the compensation paid by the Competent Authority (CA) as per the NH Act shall be paid by the Project Authority to the

entitled persons as assistance. The differential amount will be included in the micro plan to be prepared by the RAP IA.

The committee will be constituted through an executive order and or other suitable instrument within one month (30 days) from the date of mobilization of RAP implementation agency at site.

10.6 Mechanism for Implementation of RAP, Training and Capacity Building – at Project and Sub-project Level

Training and development of project staff is an integral part for implementing GNHCP (Green National Highway Corridor Project). A training needs identification shall be carried out at Central, Regional and Site level, based on which focused training modules will be developed in the first six months of project implementation;

- Strengthening in house capacity to implement the provisions of RPF/RAP,
- Creating Awareness, providing the tools for implementation of RAP, and accompanying set of management procedures to all departments,
- Developing competence within key officials to provide training in their respective level.

Based on skill requirement/improvement at all levels for proper implementation of RPF, a training programme focusing project implementing partners at Centre, State and field PIUs has been developed which will be implemented by the Project Authority (MoRT&H) in the next two years. These training programs, which will be zeroed down after a quick training needs assessment, are to be conducted with the help of local and national training institutions and experts in various aspects of social management. MoRT&H will also identify courses offered by the premier institutions in India and abroad on social management and inter-phase these with identified programme. There is a provision for separate budget for this activity. The budget reported under "institutional" head includes the cost estimates of training programs discussed above.

CHAPTER - 11.: Grievance Redressal Mechanism

The Resettlement Policy Framework (RPF) mandates formation of Grievance Redressal Mechanism in order to resolve disputes in an effective manner and at the door steps of the PAPs. Compensation and assistance as per eligibility is provided in the entitlement matrix of the approved RPF. Grievance of PAPs will be brought to the grievance redress committee for redressal. The decision of the GRC will be binding, unless vacated by court of law.

11.1 Grievance Redressal Committee (GRC)

The GRC will be constituted by the Project Authority with the aim to settle as many disputes as possible on LA and R&R through consultations and negotiations. There will be one GRC for each PIU. The GRC will comprise six members headed by a retired Revenue Officer/Social Welfare Officer not below Group I officer rank. Other members of the GRC will include the concerned Project Director-cum-Executive, a retired PWD Officer (not below the rank of Executive Engineer), RRO, representative of PAPs and Sarpanch (Elected Head of Village) of the concerned village.

Grievances of PAPs in writing will be brought to GRC for redressal by the RAP implementation agency. The RAP implementation agency will provide all necessary help to PAPs in presenting his/her case before the GRC. The GRC will respond to the grievance within 15 days. The GRC will normally meet once in a month but may meet more frequently, if the situation so demands. A time period of 45 days will be available for redressing the grievance of PAPs. The decision of the GRC will not be binding to PAPs. The decision of the Grievance Committees will not be binding on the DPs and they will have the option of taking recourse to court of law, if he/she so desires at his or her own expense. Broad functions of GRC are as under:

- Record the grievances of PAPs, categorize and prioritize them and provide solution to their grievances related to resettlement and rehabilitation assistance.
- The GRC may undertake site visit, ask for relevant information from Project Authority and other government and non-government agencies, etc, in order to resolve the grievances of PAPs. Fix a time frame within the stipulated time period of 45 days for resolving the grievance.
- Inform PAPs through implementation agency about the status of their case and their decision to PAPs and Project Authority for compliance.
- In case of grievances/complaints relating to GBV, ensure confidentiality and appropriate referral to mapped service providers

The GRC will be constituted within 3 months by an executive order from competent authority (centre/ state) from the date of mobilization of RAP implementation agency. The RRO will persuade the matter with assistance from implementation agency in identifying the suitable persons from the nearby area for the constitution of GRC. Secretarial assistance will be provided by the PIU as and when required.




Figure 11-1: Grievance Redressal Mechanism

PAPs will be fully made aware about the GRM for effective, inexpensive and amicable settlement of claims for compensation and assistance by holding meetings with PAPs, public meetings and distributing leaflets containing salient features and procedures of GRM. The RAP IA will assist the PAPs in getting their record of rights updated in case of disputes related to land. The RRO with support from RAP IA will make all possible efforts for amicable settlement. The RAP IA will document all cases brought to GRC and maintain the records of the proceedings of the grievance redressal committee meetings.

11.2 Suggestion and Complaint Handling Mechanism (SCHM)

The MoRT&H recognizes the importance of this and hence intends to establish a SCHM for the GNHCP. The communication channels to report project related complaints/concerns will be disclosed at all levels of institutions—MoRT&H, State and Sub-project levels.

Though the Right to Information Act, 2005 an Act of the Parliament of India provides for setting out the practical regime of right to information for citizens. The Act applies to all States and Union Territories of India except the State of Jammu and Kashmir. Under the provisions of the Act, any citizen may request information from a "public authority" (a body of Government or "instrumentality of State") which is required to reply expeditiously or within thirty days. The Act also requires every public authority to computerize their records for wide dissemination and to proactively publish certain categories of information so that the citizens need minimum recourse to request for information formally. In other words, under the act, citizens have right to seek information from concerned agencies by following the set procedures. However, it is quite likely that many people may not use the provisions of this Act, only in limited cases covering serious concerns. Being an inter-state project involving several states and large scale of civil works along with R&R and Environment issues, the project is likely to receive many suggestions, complaints, inquiries, etc through the project implementation period. Therefore, MoRT&H has agreed to establish SCHM as a good practice to address public concerns pertaining to various issues. SCHM will report all project related LA and R&R of the PAPs for redressal through the concerned PIU or GRC as appropriate. Several communication channels viz., toll free phone number, dedicated email. mechanism for on line submission of suggestions/complaints/inquiries, provision of suggestion/complaint box (at site and project office), post and other suitable means shall be set up for suggestion and complaint handling.

CHAPTER - 12.: Implementation Schedule

12.1 Coordination with civil works and certification

Implementation of RAP will include land acquisition, and resettlement and rehabilitation (R&R) activities. The implementation process will cover (i) identification of cut-off date and notification; (ii) verification of properties of PAPs and estimation of their type and level of losses and distribution of identity cards; (iii) preparation of PAPs for relocation through consultation, however, the process of consultation will continue throughout the RAP implementation and (iv) relocation and resettlement of the PAPs.

Implementation schedule should be revised, post-finalization of entitlements, compensation packages and the budget. This should depend on the magnitude of work to be undertaken as part of RAP implementation. PAPs should be given sufficient notice period to vacate their property before civil works begins. No civil works should begin until all PAPs receive the approved compensation package. Civil works should therefore be linked with the completion of land acquisition. In this case, all land transfers from Government have to be completed. Depending on the ownership, PIU should coordinate the DC's office and the Revenue Department. A draft Implementation Schedule is given in **table 12.1**, subject to change after revalidation of RAP.

It is assumed that implementation will take minimum 36 months to hand over land for civil works. Training for income restoration, if proposed, however shall continue for another month, estimating a total period for RAP implementation

CHAPTER - 13.: Monitoring & Evaluation (M & E)

Monitoring and evaluation are important activities of infrastructure development project particularly, those involving involuntary resettlement. It helps making suitable changes, if required during the course of implementation of RAP and also to resolve problems faced by the PAPs. Monitoring is periodical checking of planned activities and provides midway inputs, facilitates changes, if necessary and provides feedback to project authority for better management of the project activities. Evaluation on the other hand assesses the resettlement effectiveness, impact and sustainability of R&R activities. In other words, evaluation is an activity aimed at assessing whether the activities have actually achieved their intended goals and purposes. Thus monitoring and evaluation of resettlement action plan implementation are critical in order to measure the project performance and fulfillment of project objectives.

The monitoring and evaluation of RAP implementation will ensure monitoring of key indicators on inputs, outputs, project processes and evaluation of impact indicators. The overall purpose of the monitoring is to keep track of the implementation processes and progress, achievement of performance targets fixed in the annual work plans, learning lessons and taking corrective actions to deal with emerging constraints and issues. Monitoring and evaluation will constitute the following:

- Implementation progress (physical and financial aspects), monitoring of inputs, and outputs:
- Process documentation (case studies and lessons learnt);
- Impact evaluation based on sample survey and consultations; and
- Thematic studies.

13.1 Institutional Arrangement for M & E

The Resettlement Policy Framework (RPF) stipulates hiring services of an external agency (third party) for monitoring and evaluation of RAP implementation. This means the project authority through an external agency will carry out monitoring and evaluation from the subsequent month of the mobilization of RAP IA at project site. Internal monitoring will be carried out by the Social Officer of Project Coordination Unit (PCU) with assistance from R&R officer and RAP IA whereas external monitoring and evaluation will be carried by the third party engaged for the purpose. This will help monitor project activities closely. Regular monitoring by undertaking site visits and consultations with PAPs will help identify potential difficulties and problems faced in the implementation and accordingly help take timely corrective measures including deviations, if needed.

Components of monitoring will include performance monitoring i.e., physical progress of the work and impact monitoring and external evaluation. Indicative indicators to be monitored related to performance are provided in the following sections. In case during the project implementation, if some other indicators are found relevant they will also be considered for monitoring.

13.2 Monitoring and Evaluation (M&E) at Project and Sub-project Level

The Resettlement Action Plan contains indicators and benchmarks for achievement of the objectives under the resettlement programme. These indicators and benchmarks will be of three kinds:

1) Proposed indicators, indicating project inputs, expenditures, staff deployment, etc.

- 2) Output indicators, indicating results in terms of numbers of affected People compensated and resettled, training held, credit disbursed, etc.
- 3) Impact indicators, related to the longer-term effect of the project on People's lives.

The benchmarks and indicators will be limited in number, and combine quantitative and qualitative types of data. Some of these indicators may include, percentage of PAPs actually paid compensation before any loss of assets; percentage of PAPs whose incomes after resettlement are better than, or at least same as before resettlement; percentage of assets valued at replacement cost compensation; percentage grievances resolved; and/or percentage of cases to court. The first two types of indicators, related to process and immediate outputs and results, will be monitored to inform project management about progress and results, and to adjust the work programme where necessary if delays or problems arise. The results of this monitoring will be summarized in reports which will be submitted to the World Bank on a regular basis. Provision will be made for participatory monitoring involving the project affected people and beneficiaries of the resettlement programme in assessing results and impacts. The Project Authority will engage services of an external agency (third party), which will undertake independent concurrent evaluations at least twice a year during the project implementation period. At the end of the project an impact evaluation will be carried out as part of the project completion report. Such independent evaluation will focus on assessing whether the overall objectives of the project are being met and will use the defined impact indicators as a basis for evaluation. Specifically, the evaluation will assess: (i) The level of success (including the constraints and barriers) in land acquisition programme, resettlement plan, and income recovery of the PAPs after they have been displaced from the project affected area, and, (ii) the types of complaints/ grievances and the success of the handling of grievance and public complaints towards the construction of project's infra-structures, means of redress for assets and lands and the amount of compensation, resettlement, and other forms of complaints.

Summarizing, M&E would be carried out for regular assessment of both the process followed and progress of the RAP implementation. The internal monitoring will be carried out by the State PCU by the Land Acquisition cum Social Development Officer with assistance from RAP Implementation Support Agency and a quarterly report will be submitted to MoRT&H. Each quarterly report would also be uploaded on the MoRT&H website. The external agency (third party) however, would conduct assessment six monthly for each sub-project by undertaking field visits and all other necessary activities including consultations. The six monthly reports would cover detailed information on process and progress of RAP implementation. The report would highlight issues, if any that need attention of the Project Authority and suggest corrective measures that may be followed for better implementation of RAP.

13.3 Process & Performance Monitoring

Process monitoring would enable the project authority to assess whether the due process are being followed or not, whereas performance monitoring would mainly relate to achievement in measurable terms against the set targets. Monitoring report will also provide necessary guidance and inputs for any changes, if required during the course of the implementation. A list of indicators is given in **table 13.1.**

13.4 Evaluation

The external agency engaged by the Project Authority shall carry out the evaluation at two stages viz., mid-term and after the completion of RAP implementation. The evaluation will be carried out under a set term of reference. The evaluation study would involve both quantitative and qualitative surveys and compare results before and after the implementation of the project. It will focus on assessing whether the overall objectives of the project are being met and will use the defined impact indicators as a basis for evaluation. The evaluation study would undertake the following but not limited to:

- Review monthly progress report submitted by RAP Implementation Agency (RAP IA);
- Undertake consultations with PAPs in order to assess their point of view with regard to overall process;
- Intensity and effectiveness of information dissemination with regard to RAP implementation covering eligibility of different categories of PAPs, frequency of interactions by RAP IA personnel with PAPs, deployment of RAP IA staff, quality of rapport maintained by RAP IA personnel with PAPs, capability of RAP IA personnel, behavior of RAP IA staff, availability of RAP IA staff, level of satisfaction as regards the work of RAP IA, etc;
- Collect information about distribution of awareness generation materials, entitlements, distribution of identity cum entitlement card, adequacy of dissemination of information, consultations meetings with regard to policy and eligibility for entitlement, alternatives and relocation related issues, measurement and valuation of affected properties, understanding and use of grievance procedure, disbursement of assistance, and other R&R related issues, compliance of resettlement policy, etc;
- Conduct sample survey (25% of PAPs) for making comparative analysis substantiated by qualitative surveys and case studies, etc.

It may be noted that one of the key objectives of the project is improvement or at least restoration of economic status of the PAPs to the pre project level. An illustrative list of indicators is given in **table 13.2**, which would be measured against the baseline data collected for the preparation of RAP. The M&E agency would finally select the indicators for the evaluation of the project depending upon the progress of R&R activities.

13.5 Reporting

Monthly Progress Reports on the progress of RAP implementation including mobilization of staff members, opening of site offices, etc of the project would be prepared by RAP IA and submitted to the R&R Officer at sub-project level.

Quarterly Monitoring Reports shall be compiled by the LA cum SDO of Project Coordination Unit (PCU) and submitted to MoRT&H for review and onward submission to World Bank

Six monthly reports shall be prepared by the M&E agency by undertaking site visits and review of progress report, consultations, etc.

Evaluation Report shall be prepared by the M&E agency at the end of the project implementation as part of the project completion report.

CHAPTER - 14.: Labour Management Plan

14.1 Labour Management Plan

Since project involves construction work that will demand a constant supply of labourers, the influx of migrant workforce will put additional pressure on existing resources. The project will require at least 400 migrant and local labours at peak. The workforce normally consists of solitary migrant males and that can be a potential risk for the host population. However, in many cases, the migrant male member of the family might relocate his family with him. Specifically, the influx of labour force can lead to:

Risk of conflict and social unrest due to cultural differences between the labour force and local community

Risk of spread of communicable diseases due to interaction of the labour and the local community

Risk of gender-based violence

Risk of violation of child-safety measures

Health hazard for host community due to lack of sanitation facilities and waste management

Additional pressure on the local resources and social infrastructures

14.2 Child Labour and Gender Based Violence

One in every two children in Uttar Pradesh is stunted. While the state has made significant gains on several key indicators over the past decade, according to the 2011 census, the child sex ratio has deteriorated, and the number of children forced into work has increased. UP also has the largest population of socially excluded communities – scheduled castes, scheduled tribes and other so-called "backward castes" – and several indicators of health, nutrition and education are among the worst in India.

Despite the challenges, Uttar Pradesh, home to 85.3 million children under 18 years of age, is poised on the brink of change (Census 2011).

Besides being a very populous state, Uttar Pradesh also has some of the poorest development indicators, especially with regard to the status of women and girls. the percentage of ever-married women who have experienced spousal physical or sexual violence is higher in Uttar Pradesh (42%) than in the entire country (37%). In the state, more than three-fifths of women (64%) who have only daughters have a desire for more children, compared to one-fourth of the women who already have two sons. A high proportion of girls continue to get married before the legal age of 18. According to the National Family Health Survey-3 (NFHS-3), 59% of 20 to 24-year-old women were married before their 18th birthday. Early marriage is more prevalent in rural areas.

No study so far has concluded use of child labour in road construction.

14.3 Construction Labour Management Plan

Since the construction activities are mostly labour intensive by nature, therefore, it is also envisaged that many of the labourers will be employed from outside the State and hence, accommodation will be provided. These migrant labourers will be accommodated in a temporary campsite within the project area.

14.4 Objectives

The influx of migrant labour will have both negative and positive impacts on the nearby community and local environment. The labour will be accommodated in a temporary campsite within the project area which can have a significant interface with the host community. The influx of migrant workers would lead to a transient increase of population in the immediate vicinity of the project area for a limited time. This would put pressure on the local resources such as roads, fuel for cooking, water, etc. Hence, a plan has been designed to demonstrate the:

Potential impacts associated with influx on the host population and receiving environment are minimized;

Provision of safe and healthy working conditions, and a comfortable environment for migrant labour; and

To ensure compliance with the national labour laws, including guidance provided on latest COVID 19 epidemic in the country,

To lay down the procedure for prevention from COVID-19 at construction sites of the project road.

14.5 General Requirements

All migrant workers are envisaged to be accommodated in a proper temporary campsite within the project area. If migrant workers are accompanied by their families, provisions should be made accordingly. As per the National Acts, the inclusion of requirements for labour camp to be established by contractors during construction phase of the project. Contractor(s) shall ensure implementation of the following measures to minimize the potential negative impacts of worker accommodation and workers on local communities:

Cleanliness and Sanitization: Pest extermination, vector control, and disinfection are to be carried out throughout the living facilities in compliance with local requirements and/or good practice. In light of the COVID-19 outbreak and increased risks to community health and safety and occupational health and safety, the contractor needs to put in place a COVID-19 preparedness and response plan as outlined. WORLD Bank's COVID-19 Consideration in Construction/Civil Works Projects. Additionally, refer to ILO Standards and COVID-19 FAQ1, issued on March 23, 2020 - provides a compilation of answers to most frequently asked questions related to labour standards and COVID-19.

Complaints and incident reporting: A formal Complaints Procedure will be implemented to ensure timely and transparent response to complaints as received from labour.

Labour education: The workforce will be sensitized to local social and cultural practices through the provision of an induction course for all employees that stipulates expected behaviour;

Labour behaviour in the campsite provided: A Code of Behaviour governing appropriate behaviour in the accommodation facilities to be kept in place and to be strictly enforced. The contractor shall ensure implementation of the "rules of engagement" between labourers

living in campsite and community and shall be implemented by construction contractors for all engaged labourers.

Labour Compensation and Accommodation: The client shall ensure that labourers are provided with benefits such as leave, weekly rest day, etc. Accommodation to be provided for the construction labour which covers facilities (including catering facilities, dining areas, washing and laundry facilities, etc.) and supporting utilities.

14.6 Hiring and Recruitment Procedure

The manpower contractor shall, wherever possible, locally recruit the available workforce and shall provide appropriate and requisite on job and EHS training as necessary. The following general measures shall be considered for the workforce during their employment tenure:

The implementing agency in consultation with the PMU will include a code of conduct relating to the accommodation to be signed with the contract document of contractors.

The contractor shall not employ any person below the age of 18 years nor will have any forced labour;

The construction labourers will be provided with documented information regarding their rights under national labour and employment law such as but not limited to Factories Act, Minimum Wages Act, Trade Unions Act, and Workmen's Compensation Act;

First priority for employment of labour should be given those impacted by the project and others in the project area;

No discrimination shall be done by the construction contractor with respect to recruitment and hiring, compensation (including wages and benefits), working conditions and terms of employment, access to training, job assignment, termination of employment or retirement, and disciplinary practices;

The contractor to ensure that work hours are set at eight hours a day, 48 hours a week, with a weekly rest day for all engaged labour;

Every labour is entitled to a maximum of only two hours a day as Overtime (OT) work. OT pay is twice the hourly remuneration;

The project will ensure that equal wages for male and female workers for work of equal nature or value is maintained;

A grievance redressal mechanism for workers to be put in place by the contractor to raise workplace concerns. The workers to be informed about the grievance mechanism at the time of recruitment; and

The Contractor to ensure that they develop and implement a procedure to review the performance of their sub-contractors.

The procedure developed should include regular inspection of the camp sites, maintaining information pertaining to labour sourced by sub-contractors;

14.7 Worker's Accommodation

The contractor will supervise and monitor the activities performed by their contractor and accommodation facilities provided in the campsite. The following measures shall be provided:

The labourers to be provided accommodation shall be made of insulating material and locally available building material, etc. along with storage of personal belongings;

The migrant workers with families will be provided with individual accommodation comprising bedroom, sanitary and cooking facilities;

The units to be supported by common latrines and bathing facilities duly segregated for male and female labour; A minimum of 1 unit to 15 males and 1 unit for 10 females shall be provided;

The contractor shall provide a canteen facility with facility to cook food of appropriate nutritional value respecting religious/cultural backgrounds;

All doors and windows shall be lockable and mobile partitions/curtains shall be provided for privacy;

Dust bins to be provided for collection of garbage and to be removed on a daily basis;

It is also required to provide first aid box in adequate numbers; and

Ventilation should be appropriate for the climatic conditions and provide workers with a comfortable and healthy environment to rest and spend their spare time.

14.8 Security

The contractors shall put in place the following security measures to ensure the safety of the workers. The following measures shall be incorporated:

Access to the campsite shall be limited to the residing workforce;

The contractor shall be responsible for deploying an adequate number of guards;

Adequate, day-time night-time lighting shall be provided;

The security personnel shall be provided with training to respect the community traditions and in dealing with, use of force, etc.; and

The rental accommodation shall be provided with firefighting equipment and portable fire extinguishers.

14.9 Provisions for Drinking Water

Access to an adequate and convenient supply of free potable water is a necessity for workers. The domestic water conforming to the IS 10500:2012 supply shall be made available by the contractor.

The direct usage of water from bore well should not be allowed;

The Contractor(s) should regularly monitor the quality of drinking water. In case of non-compliance with the Drinking Water Specifications, additional treatment shall be provided, or alternative sources of water supply shall be arranged; and

All storage container of drinking water to be monitored from becoming polluted or contaminated.

14.10 Cooking Arrangements

Places for food preparation are designed to permit good food hygiene practices, including protection against contamination between and during food preparation;

Adequate personal hygiene including a sufficient number of washbasins designated for cleaning hands with clean, running water; and

All kitchen floors, ceiling and wall surfaces adjacent to or above food preparation and cooking areas are built using durable, non-absorbent, easily cleanable, non-toxic materials;

Food preparation tables are equipped with a smooth, durable, easily cleanable, non-corrosive surface made of non-toxic materials.

To ensure that the fuel need of labourers in the project area does not interfere with the local requirements, necessary arrangements for supply of fuel to the labourers shall be done by the contractor.

14.11 Wastewater Generation

There will of generation of wastewater from the campsite. About 80% of water used shall be generated as sewage/wastewater.

Contractors to ensure that the campsite is equipped with the septic tank and soak pit for disposal of sewage. It is also recommended that the storm water and sewage system should be separate. The surface water drainage shall include all necessary gutters, down pipes, gullies, traps, catch pits, manholes, etc.

Sanitary and toilet facilities are constructed of materials that are easily cleanable. Sanitary and toilet facilities are required to be cleaned frequently and kept in working condition.

14.12 Solid Waste Management

The solid waste generated from the campsite will mostly comprise compostable wastes like vegetable (kitchen waste) and combustible waste like paper, cans, plastic and some non-degradable waste like glass/glass bottles. The following measures shall be adopted by contractors to ensure effective management of solid waste:

The solid wastes of domestic nature generated shall be collected and stored separately in appropriate containers with proper sealing on them;

Separate bins with proper markings in terms of recyclable or non-recyclable waste shall be provided in the houses and kitchen premises in sufficient numbers for collection of garbage;

Food waste and other refuse are to be adequately deposited in sealable containers and removed from the kitchen frequently to avoid accumulation; and

The contractor shall identify the nearest municipal solid waste storage facility and tie up with the concerned urban local body for disposal of waste at frequent intervals.

14.13 Medical Facilities

The following medical facilities shall be provided by contractors for the construction workers:

A first aid center shall be provided for the labour within the construction site equipped with medicines and other basic facilities;

Adequate first aid kits shall be provided in the campsite in an accessible place. The kit shall contain all type of medicines and dressing material;

Contractor shall identify and train an adequate number of workers to provide first aid during medical emergencies;

Regular health check-ups shall be carried out for the construction labourers every six month and health records shall be maintained:

Labours should have easy access to medical facilities and first aider; where possible, nurses should be available for female workers;

First aid kits are adequately stocked. Where possible a 24/7 first aid service/facility is available.

An adequate number of staff/workers is trained to provide first aid; and

Information and awareness of communicable diseases, AIDS, etc. shall be provided to workers.

14.14 Recreation Facilities

Basic collective social/rest spaces are provided to workers.

Facilities like a common television can be provided in labour camps

14.15 Inspection of Accommodation Facilities

The campsite shall be inspected at frequent intervals to ensure that the facilities are well organized and maintained to acceptable and appropriate standards by the Contractor. The key areas are:

Daily sweeping of rooms and houses shall be undertaken;

Regular cleaning of sanitary facilities shall be undertaken;

The kitchen and canteen premises shall be established under good hygiene conditions;

Daily meal times shall be fixed for the labour;

Smoking and alcohol consumption shall be prohibited in the workplace;

Water logging shall be prevented at areas near the accommodation facilities and adequate drainage is to be provided; and

Checklists pertaining to the daily housekeeping schedule shall be maintained and displayed at houses, toilets, and kitchen.

To limit the impact due to cumulative labour onsite during the construction phase, contractors shall provide adequate labour camp which should be appropriate for its location and be clean, safe and, at a minimum, meet the basic needs of workers.

Contractors should assess the location of labour camp, that it should not be constructed in the immediate vicinity of any drainage channel;

It should be ensured that the labour camp(onsite)should have basic amenities such as electricity, drinking water, health& sanitation facility, kitchen and rest room;

All tanks used for the storage of drinking water are constructed and covered as to prevent water stored therein from becoming polluted or contaminated and all the migrant workers will be instructed accordingly;

Employers should ensure that accommodation which is provided is not overcrowded and does not pose a risk to the health and safety of workers;

The labour camp will be equipped with sceptic tanks and soak pits and avoid the presence of stagnant water is a factor of the proliferation of potential disease vectors such as mosquitoes;

Contractors should ensure that the disruption of local communities is minimum, in particular, local communities' transport infrastructures and if required limit the worker's movements in nearby areas;

Security staffs have a clear mandate and have received clear instruction about their duties and responsibilities, in particular, their duties not to harass, intimidate, discipline or discriminate against workers;

Contractors should ensure that workers and members of the surrounding communities have specific means to raise concerns about security arrangement and staff;

Where possible, an adequate transport system to surrounding communities will be provided. It is good practice to provide workers with free transportation to and from local communities

Specifically:

The contractor and labourers will sign a code of conduct by contractors and workers to maintain good manners with the community and avoid gender-based violence;

Project will undertake awareness raising program for the workers and community on the risk of labour influx; and

To the extent possible, the local workforce will be engaged to minimize the influx of workers

14.16 Impact of influx of migrant labourer

The contractor will preferably engage the local labour force except for the labourer's requiring special skills and the non-availability of such skilled laborers from the local area.

Awareness raising of laborers/ workers on societal norms, taboos, and other cultural practices

Organize awareness creation and educational programmes for all workers and the general public on the behavioral changes required to prevent the spread of HIV/AIDS and other STDs

The 'Labour Influx and Construction Workers Campsite Management Plan' will be implemented

Project to assess and manage labour influx risk based on risks identified in the ESIA. Depending on the risk factors and their level, appropriate site-specific Labour Influx Management Plan and/or a Workers' Camp Management Plan.

The project will incorporate the ESMP into the civil works contract. The responsibilities for managing these adverse impacts will be clearly reflected as a contractual obligation, with a mechanism for addressing non-compliance.

Employment of any person under 18 years of age will be strictly prohibited. The contractor will maintain a labour register with name, age, and sex with supporting document (preferably copy of Aadhar card or voter's ID card). This will be monitored by the nominated Environmental cum Social officer of the contractors.

Contractor and labourer will sign a code of conduct to maintain good manners with the community and avoid GBV

Project will undertake awareness raising program for the workers and community on the risk of labour influx

14.17 Avoiding Gender Based Violence

Contractor will prepare and implement robust measures to address the risk of gender-based violence that include.

Mandatory and repeated training and awareness raising for the workforce about refraining from unacceptable conduct toward local community members, specifically women;

Informing workers about national laws that make sexual harassment and gender-based violence a punishable offence which is prosecuted;

introducing a Worker Code of Conduct as part of the employment contract and including sanctions for non-compliance (e.g., termination), and (iv) contractors adopting a policy to cooperate with law enforcement agencies in investigating complaints about gender-based violence.

Additional measures can aim to reduce incentives to engage with the local community by providing workers with the opportunity to spend their time off away from the host community, where feasible with a small transport allowance, ideally allowing workers to regularly return for brief visits to their families, spouses, and friends, or to visit nearby urban centres that provide a variety of legal social opportunities. For workers who need to travel further it may be attractive to forego weekends off in exchange for longer breaks that would allow for such home leave travel

14.18 Contractor's and Borrower's Responsibilities

Within 30 days from the appointed date, the Contractor shall prepare and submit 4 hard copies and 1 soft copy of Labour Influx and Worker's Camp Management Plan to the concerned PEA that addresses specific activities that will be undertaken to minimize the impact on the local community, including elements such as worker codes of conduct, training programs on HIV/AIDS, etc. A Workers' Camp Management Plan addresses specific aspects of the establishment and operation of workers' camps.

14.19 This Labour Influx and Worker's Camp Management Plan will include:

Mandatory and repeated training and awareness raising for the workforce about refraining from unacceptable conduct toward local community members, specifically women;

Informing workers about national laws that make sexual harassment and gender-based violence a punishable offence which is prosecuted;

introducing a Worker Code of Conduct as part of the employment contract and including sanctions for non-compliance (e.g., termination), manual scavenging, engagement with local residents, child labour, non-discrimination, harassment of co-workers including women and those belonging to SC and STs and other minority social groups,

Contractors adopting a policy to cooperate with law enforcement agencies in investigating complaints about gender-based violence.

14.20 Training programs on HIV/AIDS and other communicable diseases,

workers' Camp Management Plan addressing specific aspects of the establishment and operation of workers' camps provided the Local Body/ Executing Agency is unable to cater to the demand for affordable housing for this additional workforce in terms of rentals, hostels, apartments, etc.; and complaint handling Mechanism at the project level

Additional measures that aim to reduce incentives to engage with the local community by providing workers with the opportunity to spend their time off away from the host community, where feasible with a small transport allowance, ideally allowing workers to regularly return for brief visits to their families, spouses, and friends, or to visit nearby urban centres that provide a variety of legal social opportunities. For workers who need to travel further, it may be attractive to forego weekends off in exchange for longer breaks that would allow for such home leave travel.

While clear and decisive measures by the contractor are critically important, the effectiveness of these measures often depends on complementary actions by the Borrower. Those are typically focused on public administration and law enforcement, such as:

Reinforcing local police in a remote setting, where services may not be sufficiently staffed or equipped to maintain public order after the influx;

Ensuring that complaints about gender-based violence are taken seriously by local law enforcement, which may be supported by deploying female officers to the project area, and

Participating in training with workers to demonstrate the presence of

Government authority in the project area.

14.21 Responsibility for Labour Management Plan& Grievance Redressal Committee

The contractor will be responsible for the implementation of the Labour Management Plan (LMP) including the labours engaged by the sub-contractors at project sites. The PMC will ensure strict adherence to the same. The work progress report submitted by the contractor shall mandatorily include a section on LMP. In addition, internal and external monitoring reports shall also cover LMP. The M&E consultant shall also cover LMP based on a visit to labour camps, discussion with labours/group of labours at different project sites, contractor's representative in-charge of labour management, and PMC.

The workers will not be able to access project GRM. Their grievances will be limited to non-payment or delayed payment of wages, no break from work, working hours, facilities at labour camp, etc. It will be the responsibility of the contractor to constitute a committee which would address the grievances of workers at site. The committee will include the Project Head of the contractor, the Resident Engineer of PMC and Team Leader of NGO. The name and phone number of these individuals will be displayed on project information board. The grievances of workers will be covered in the MPR of PMC and NGO.

14.22 COVID-19 Protocol

Corona virus disease (COVID-19) is an infectious disease caused by the newly discovered corona virus which is mainly transmitted through droplets generated when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or exhales. One can be infected by breathing in the virus if within close proximity of someone who has COVID-19, or by touching a contaminated surface and then eyes, nose or mouth. Most people who fall sick with COVID-19 will experience mild to moderate symptoms and recover without special treatment.

The COVID-19 pandemic presents unprecedented challenges. Projects involving construction/civil works involve a large workforce with associated supply chains. As such there will be regular entry and exit of people providing support services at construction sites. Besides, there will be local workers and others who after work will return to their homes and interact with family members and others in the community. This creates unprecedented challenges and therefore managing issues related to COVID-19 require an adaptive responsive management system to avoid, minimize and manage an evolving situation.

In context of upgrading of project roads, it is estimated that at a given time the maximum number of work force required during the pick construction time will be approximately 400. Experience indicates that group of specialized work force (say bar benders, steel works, machine operators, bridge/flyover construction workers, etc) move from one construction site to another construction site with the civil contractor. These specialized groups of workers (mainly skilled and semi-skilled) are migrant workers. They stay together at construction site and generally work on contract basis. Majority of these migrant groups of workers belong to different parts of the country. Since, these groups of workers move from one location to another location, it is quite likely that these workers could become vectors for transmission of COVID-19 to other workers at project road construction sites and community while travelling by local transport facilities, buying groceries, vegetables, medicines, etc and various other activities. Interactions of migrant workers are bound to happen with other project staff working, fellow local workers, local community, and others in one way or the other way. It may not be possible to fully isolate the migrant workers from interactions with others and hence dealing with migrant workers at construction site will require additional considerations.

In view of the above, the Public Works Department, GoUP has developed a Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) for UPCRNP, Phase I for COVID-19 Pandemic based on the guidelines of Ministry of Home Affairs, GoI & State Government. The SOP for COVID-19 for Phase I shall be also applicable to the upgrading of project road (SH-88).

14.23 Objectives

The objectives of the COVID-19 protocol are:

To ensure compliance with guidance provided on latest COVID 19 pandemic in the country,

To lay down the procedure for prevention from COVID-19 at construction sites of the project road.

14.24 Scope of COVID-19

The SOP will be applicable to everyone (all employees/consultants/clients, sub-contractor's employees, material suppliers, visitors, service providers, etc) at the construction sites. The PMC & PWD will ensure that the SOP for COVID-19 is strictly followed at everyone at the construction sites irrespective of the presence of migrant workers and project staff from outside the state.

14.25 Procedure

The procedures to be followed at sites are listed below:

Deep Cleaning and Sanitization of all areas in the premises,

Work Force Planning,

Workers Mobility,

Screening of employees prior to work,

Prior to Work Basic Provisions for Workers/employees,

Employees and Workers' Responsibility,

Working Practices at Project Site,

Screening of all Visitors/ Material Suppliers / Vendors,

Workers' Camp (Housing/ Accommodation),

Health care for workers,


Code of conduct and communication,

Posters, Helpline and Training,

Documentation & Compliance,

Emergency Process (to deal with case of a suspected case),

Subject: Land acquisition under the National Highways Act, 1956 - comprehensive guidelines thereon.

Sir.

I am directed to say that the land required for National Highway Projects is acquired under the provisions contained in Section 3 of the National Highways (NH) Act, 1956. Pursuant to the enactment of the RFCTLARR Act of 2013 and its coming into force with effect from 01.01.2014, certain provisions of the 2013 Act became applicable to the other related Acts mentioned in the Fourth Schedule, including the NH Act, 1956 with effect from 01.01.2015 in terms of Section 105(3) of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013.

- 2. Accordingly, the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways (MoRTH) has issued various OMs/ Circulars on the subject from time to time, as mentioned at Annexure-1. Similarly, the Department of Land Resources, Ministry of Rural Development, have also issued guidelines/ orders on the subject, being the nodal Department of Government of India for the administration of RFCTLARR Act, 2013 and its application to the other related statutes mentioned in the Fourth Sechedule of the Act ibid. These guidelines/ orders/ clarifications are mentioned in Annexure 2.
- 3. The entire issue has been examined afresh in view of the calrifications emerging in due course of time. The Ld. Attorney General of India has also been consulted on certain issues. Accordingly, it has been decided to issue these comprehensively revised guidelines in supersession of the guidelines issued hereinbefore. These are as follows:
- Applicability of the 'RFCTLARR Act 2013' to the enactments mentioned in the Fourth Schedule of the Act ibid:
- (i) The 'RFCTLARR Act 2013' came into force with effect from 01.01.2014. Section 105 of the Act deals with the subject of applicability of provisions of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 to the related statutes enumerated in the Fourth Schedule. Provisions of Section 105 (3) read as under:



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- "(3) The Central Government shall, by notification, within one year from the date of commencement of this Act, direct that any of the provisions of this Act relating to the determination of compensation in accordance with the First Schedule and rehabilitation and resettlement specified in the Second and Third Schedules, being beneficial to the affected families, shall apply to the cases of land acquisition under the enactments specified in the Fourth Schedule or shall apply with exceptions or modifications that do not reduce the compensation or dilute the provisions of this Act relating to compensation or rehabilitation and resettlement as may be specified in the notification, as the case may be."
- (ii) The Central Government came out with an Ordinance (No. 9 of 2014) dated 31st December, 2014, entailing an amendment to, inter-alia, Section 105 vide Clause 10 of the Ordinance, substituting sub-section (3) of Section 105 and omitted Subsection (4) of Section 105. The substituted sub-Section (3) is reproduced below:
 - "(3) The provisions of this Act relating to the determination of compensation in accordance with the First Schedule, rehabilitation and resettlement in accordance with the Second Schedule and infrastructure amenities in accordance with the Third Schedule shall apply to the enactments relating to land acquisition specified in the Fourth Schedule with effect from 1st January 2015."
- (iii) The provisions of Ordinance No. 9 of 2014 were continued further vide Ordinance No. 4 of 2015 dated 03.04.2015 and vide Second Ordinance dated 30.05.2015 (No. 5 of 2015) which was valid up to 31st August, 2015.
- 4.2 Subsequently, the Department of Land Resources, Ministry of Rural Development, Government of India, issued The RFCTLARR (Removal of Difficulties) Order, 2015 vide Notification dated 28th August, 2015. The said Order is reproduced below:
 - "(1) This Order may be called the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement (Removal of Difficulties) Order, 2015.
 - (2) It shall come into force with effect from the 1st day of September, 2015.
 - (3) The provisions of the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013, relating to the determination of compensation in accordance with the First Schedule, rehabilitation and resettlement in accordance with the Second Schedule and infrastructure amenities in accordance with the Third Schedule shall apply to all cases of land acquisition under the enactments specified in the Fourth Schedule to the said Act."
- 4.3 It is clear from a reading of the above that requisite action in compliance of Section 105(3) was taken within one year's time with the promulgation of Ordinance No. 9 of 2014 dated 31.12.2014. This position continued with the issuance of two Ordinances in 2015, which was thereafter followed by the

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'Removal of Difficulties Order" without any break in time. As such, operation of the provisions of RFCTLARR Act 2013, which came into effect from 01.01.2014, has been given effect in respect of the enactments specified in the Fourth Schedule (including the NH Act, 1956) with effect from 01.01.2015, in compliance of sub-section (3) of Section 105 of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013.

4.4 Following the notification of the aforesaid Ordinances, the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways issued a letter dated 29.04.2015 whereby the select provisions of RFCTLARR Act, 2013 were made applicable to the NH Act, 1956 with effect from 01.01.2015. A conjoint reading of the aforesaid shows that the Ordinance (Amendment) remained in force till 31th August 2015, 'Removal of Difficulties Order' was issued by the Department of Land Resources on 28th August 2015, which took effect from 01.09.2015. However, since the date of application of the selected relevant provisions of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 to the NH Act, 1956 was 01.01.2015 in terms of the Ordinance (Amendment) No. 9 of 2014, it remains an unambiguous and accepted position that the provisions of the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013, relating to the determination of compensation in accordance with the First Schedule, rehabilitation and resettlement in accordance with the Second Schedule and infrastructure amenities in accordance with the Third Schedule have been made applicable to all cases of land acquisition under the NH Act, 1956, i.e. the enactment specified at Sr. No. 7 in the Fourth Schedule to the RFCTLARR Act, with effect from 01.01.2015.

4.5 Applicability of Section 24 of the RFCTLARR Act 2013 to the NH Act, 1956.

(i) MoRT&H had issued instructions vide OM bearing No. 11011/30/2015-LA dated 13th January 2016 clarifying that Section 24 of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 was applicable to the NH Act, 1956. However, the issue as to whether Section 24 of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 is applicable to the NH Act, 1956 has been under consideration and revisited in consultation with the Ld. Attorney General, who has observed as under:

"A reading of Section 24 makes it abundantly clear that the provision is applicable only to acquisitions that have been undertaken under the Land Acquisition Act, 1894, in as much as the legislative intent can be ascertained from the specific mention of the 'Land Acquisition Act, 1894'. Further, Section 105(1) of the RFCTLARR Act 2013 specifically excludes the application of any Section of the RFCTLARR Act 2013 to the Acts mentioned in the Fourth Schedule. The only exception to Section 105(1) is Section 105(3), which makes only the First, Second and Third Schedule applicable to the Fourth Schedule Acts."



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(ii) As such, it is now clear that Section 24 of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 is not applicable to the acquisitions under the NH Act, 1956.

4.6 Date of determination of market value of land

- (i) Another related but important question is regarding the date on which the market value of land is to be determined in cases where land acquisition proceedings had been initiated under the NH Act, 1956 and were at different stages as on 31.12.2014. While there is no ambiguity regarding land acquisition proceedings initiated on or after 01.01.2015, this question assumes significance in view of the financial implications in respect of cases where the process of acquisition was at different stages as on 01.01.2015.
- (ii) Section 26 of the RFCTLARR Act stipulates that "the date for determination of market value shall be the date on which the notification has been issued under Section 11 (corresponding to Section 3 A of the NH Act)". Same was the position under the 1894 Act. This is further fortified from the provisions contained in Section 69(2) of the RFCTLARR Act. As such, it is clarified that the relevant date of determination of market value of land is the date on which notification under Section 3 A of the National Highways Act, 1956 is published.
- (iii) By now, it is also a settled proposition that the First, Second and Third Schedule of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 shall be applicable to the NH Act, 1956 with effect from 01.01.2015. As such, the following is clarified:
 - (a) All cases of Land acquisition where the Awards had not been announced under Section 3G of the NH Act till 31.12.2014 or where such awards had been announced but compensation had not been paid in respect of majority of the land holdings under acquisition as on 31.12.2014, the compensation would be payable in accordance with the First Schedule of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013.
 - (b) In cases, where the land acquisition process was initiated and award of compensation under Section 3G had also been announced before 01.01.2015 but the full amount of Award had not been deposited by the acquiring agency with the CALA, the compensation amount would be liable to be determined in accordance with the First Schedule w.e.f. 01.01.2015;
 - (c) In cases, where the process of acquisition of land stood completed (i.e. Award under Section 3G announced by CALA, amount deposited by the acquiring agency with the CALA, and compensation paid to the landowners in respect of majority of the land under acquisition) as on or before 31.12.2014, the process would be deemed to have been completed and settled. Such cases would not be re-opened.



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- Payment of additional amount calculated @ 12% on the market value in terms of sub-section (3) of Section 30 of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013
- 5.1 Another issue that has emerged pertains to the admissibility of payment of an additional amount calculated @12% per annum on the market value of land in respect of acquisitions under the NH Act, 1956 as it is not mentioned under the First Schedule to the RFCTLARR Act, 2013. The position has been carefully examined in terms of the provisions in this behalf. Sub-section (3) of Section 30 of the RFCTLARR Act reads as under:

"In addition to the market value of the land provided under Section 26, the Collector shall, in every case, award an amount calculated at the rate of twelve percent per annum on such market value for the period commencing on and from the date of publication of the notification of the Social Impact assessment study under sub-section (2) of Section 4, in respect of such land, till the date of the award of the Collector or the date of taking possession of the land, whichever is earlier."

5.2 Sub-section (3) of Section 105 of the RFCTLARR Act stipulates that:

"The Central Government shall, by notification, within one year from the date of commencement of this Act, direct that any of the provisions of this Act relating to determination of compensation in accordance with the First Schedule and rehabilitation and resettlement specified in the Second and Third Schedules, being beneficial to the affected families, shall apply to the cases of land acquisition under the enactments specified in the Fourth Schedule or shall apply with such exceptions or modifications that do not reduce the compensation or dilute the provisions of this Act relating to compensation or rehabilitation and resettlement as may be specified in the notification, as the case may be."

- 5.3 The proviso under Section 26 of the RFCTLARR Act stipulates that "the date for determination of market value shall be the date on which the notification has been issued under Section 11 (corresponding to Section 3 A of the NH Act)". Similarly, Section 69 (2) of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 also stipulates that such additional amount is to be "calculated @ 12% on such market value for the period commencing on and from the date of publication of the preliminary notification under section 11 in respect of such land to the date of the award of the Collector or the date of taking possession of the land, whichever is earlier". Since the acquisition of land for the National Highways is exempted from the Social Impact Assessment, it is absolutely clear from a harmonious reading of all related provisions that the calculation of such amount shall be made with effect from the date of publication of the Notification under Section 3A of the NH Act, 1956.
- 5.4 The compensation amount has to be determined in accordance with the First Schedule, (which contains references to Section 26, 29 and 30(1) of the RFCTLARR Act) in its application to the NH Act. Provision for amount calculated @ 12%

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interest is under sub-section (3) of Section 30 of the RFCTLARR Act, to which no reference has been made in the First Schedule. Further, Section 30(3) stipulates that the additional amount calculated @ 12% is payable with effect from the date of publication of the notification of the Social Impact Assessment Study, which is not applicable to the land acquisition for National Highways. On the other hand, Section 69(2) of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 stipulates that the additional amount calculated @ 12% is to be calculated from the date of publication of the preliminary notification under Section 11 (corresponding to Section 3(a) of the NH Act, 1956). Further, the Ordinances and the Removal of Difficulties Order do not include the portion "being beneficial to the affected families, shall apply to the cases of land acquisition under the enactments specified in the Fourth Schedule or shall apply with such exceptions or modifications that do not reduce the compensation or dilute the provisions of this Act relating to compensation or rehabilitation and resettlement as may be specified in the notification, as the case may be". Hence, a strict textual reading of the relevant provisions shows that it is an arguable point if the 'amount' under Section 30(3) is payable in respect of land acquired under the NH Act, 1956 or not.

- 5.5 However, a harmonious reading of all the related provisions of the RFCTLARR Act, the pronouncements of the Courts on payment of compensation under Section 23 (1A), Section 23(2) and Section 28 of the Land Acquisition Act, 1894 in respect of land acquired under the NH Act, 1956, read with Section 105(3) of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013, especially when the market value has to be reckoned as on the date of issue of Section 3A of the NH Act, would go to show that payment of 'amount' of 12% on the market value of land from the date of publication of Section 3A of the NH Act, 1956 till the announcement of award under Section 3G or taking possession of land, whichever is earlier, is payable.
- 5.6 This issue has been examined in detail by the Ld. Attorney General who has finally opined "that a holistic reading of the provisions of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 would require the payment of the 'amount' mentioned under Section 30(3) of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013". As such, in supersession of the OM bearing No. NH-11011/140/2017-P&M/LA dated 7th September 2017, vide which it was clarified that the said 'amount', not being part of the First Schedule to the Act, was not payable in respect of land acquisition under the NH Act, 1956, it is clarified that the 'amount' calculated @ 12% per annum, as prescribed under Section 30(3) of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013, though not specifically mentioned in the First Schedule, would be payable to the landowners.
- 5.7 Still, another set of two questions arise i.e. (i) the date from which the amount payable under Section 30(3) is to be calculated, and (ii) as to whether the 'amount' as mentioned in Section 30(3) of the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 is a stand-



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alone component and paid as such or it would get added to the market value, and then count for the purposes of Multiplication Factor and/ or Solatium also. This issue has also been examined by the Ld. Attorney General, whose opinion is reproduced below:

"There are two other issues that are related to payment of 'amount' under Section 30(3). The first is in regard to the date from which this amount has to be calculated. Section 30(3) states that this date will be the date of 'social impact assessment' under Section 4 of the RFCTLARR Act. However, Section 4 is not applicable to the national Highways Act, Therefore, as was being done earlier, this amount may be paid from the date of issuance of preliminary notification under Section 3A of the National Highways Act. The second issue is in regard to whether this 'amount' is a standalone component or wheher the same has to be calculated after addition of the multiplication factor and solatium. The answer to this question is to be found in Section 30(3) which clearly states that the amount is payable in addition to to the market value of the land and is calculated as a percentage of 'market value'. There is a distinction between 'market value' and compensation. Market value is determined under Section 26. Section 27 provides that the Collector having determined the total market value, will proceed to determine the compensation. This compensation is determined under Section 28 of the Act. Therefore, a reading of these sections would lead to the conclusion that the 'amount' has to be awarded only on the 'market value' which in turn is determined under Section 26 of the Act."

5.8 It may be noted that the computation of different components of the total compensation is in seriatum and sequential from Section 26 to Section 30 of the RFTCLARR Act, 2013. Keeping the aforesaid opinion of the Ld. Attorney General in view, and the fact that the payment of 'amount' under Section 30(3) has been prescribed as "In addition ..." after the provision for payment of solatium, it is clarified that it would be payable as a 'stand-alone component' and shall not count for the purposes of Multiplication Factor and the Solatium. Illustration given in Annexure - 4 to these guidelines may be referred for correct methood of calculation of the compensation amount.

Issue of the Multiplication Factor (MF)

- 6.1 It is clear that the compensation of land acquired under the NH Act, 1956 with effect from 01.01.2015 is to be determined in accordance with the provisions contained in the First Schedule to the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 (in so far as it relates to the Multiplication Factor prescribed by the appropriate government).
- 6.2 The Department of Land Resources, Ministry of Rural Development, Government of India issued a Notification dated 9th February 2016 in this behalf, which reads as under:

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"In exercise of the powers conferred by column No. 3 of serial No. "2 of the First Schedule read with sub-section (2) of Section 30 of the Right to Fair Compensation and Transparency in Land Acquisition, Rehabilitation and Resettlement Act, 2013 (30 of 2013), the Central Government, hereby, notifies that in the case of rural areas, the factor by which the market value is to be multiplied shall be 2.00 (two)."

- 6.3 Soon after the aforesaid Notification was issued by the Department of Land Resources, certain states like Andhra Pradesh, Maharashtra, Punjab, Jharkhand, Chhatisgarh and Bihar started using a Multiplication Factor of 2.00 in respect of land acquired/ to be acquired for the NH Projects (read Central Government Projects) on the basis of 9th February Notification of the Department of Land Resources whereas the Multiplication Factor applicable to the jurisdiction of the state was to be notified by the appropriate government. The MoRTH also issued two OMs dated 12.08.2015 and 08.08.2016 on the subject. A reference was made in this behalf by the then Chairman, NHAI to the Secretary, Department of Land Resources. Certain references were also made by the states. The reference specifically mentioned the issue of two different sets of MFs being adopted by certain states for the Central Projects and the State Projects. The State of Chhatisgrah continues with such classification even on date.
- 6.4 Some of these confusions have been set at rest and clarified by the DoLR vide its letter F. No. 13013/02/2016-LRD dated 8th May, 2017, more specifically the issue of differential MFs for the State and the Central Projects. The DoLR has further clarified vide its F. No. 13013/02/2016-LRD dated 14th December 2017 that the DoLR Notification of 9th February 2016 was applicable only to the UTs, except Puducherry, as the DoLR is the appropriate Government only in respect of the UTs, except Puducherry.
- 6.5 The DoLR Notification of 9th February 2016 prima facie appears to be inconsistent with the provisions contained in the First Schedule, especially in respect of the following three points:
 - Firstly, it gave an impression (though erroneous) as if the Central Government was the 'appropriate government' to notify the Multiplication Factor (MF) in respect of all Central Government projects across all the states;
 - (ii) Secondly, it did not clearly state that the Notification was applicable only in relation to the Union Territories, except Puducherry;
 - (iii) Thirdly, the prescription of a MF of 2.00 without co-relating the distance of the project from the urban area is prima facie inconsistent with the contents of the First Schedule. The said entry reads as under:

6.6 The DoLR, however, has clarified the position with regard to the points mentioned at (i) and (ii) of para 6.5 above, as mentioned under para 6.4 above. The DoLR has clarified vide its OM of 8th May 2017 that there cannot be two sets of Multiplication Factors, one for the state projects and the other for the Central projects. Since the issue regarding sub para (iii) of para 6.5 above still remained unsettled, the matter was referred to the Ld. Attorney General, who has opined as under:

"The MoRTH has sought my opinion on whether it is open to the appropriate Government to fix a uniform multiplication factor of 2 for all rural lands. The query is a result of notifications issued by the Department of Land Resources and certain states like ... which have stated a multiplication factor of 2 in respect of land acquired/ to be acquired for all National Highway Projects whereas a different multiplication factor has been prescribed for land acquired by the State Government.

In my opinion, the appropriate government must have a graded approach to fixing the multiplication factor. This is evident from the words in the schedule "1.00 (one) to 2.00 (two) based on the distance of project from the urban area". For this purpose, the appropriate government has to apply its mind and take into consideration the distance of lands from urban areas."

- 6.7 A number of states like West Bengal, Rajasthan, Mahrasthra and others have already notified the graded scale of Mutiplication Factor as applicable in their respective jurisdiction. The position in this behalf, as available with MoRTH on the date of issue of these guidelines, is enclosed as Annexure 3. While the matter is being taken up with the DoLR again to revisit its Notification of 9th February 2017 with regard to a single Multiplication Factor of 2.00 for the rural areas qua the UTs (except the state of Puducherry), the concerned officers of MoRTH and NHAI/ NHIDCL are advised to take up the matter with the states where a uniform MF of 2.0 has been notified for the Rural Areas without using a scale/ graded MF linking the distance of the project area from the urban limits.
- 6.8 The Chief Secretaries of the concerned states like Bihar, Chhatisgarh, Gujarat, Jharkhand, Uttrarakhand and Uttar Pradesh are requested to take necessary corrective measures in this matter in order to ensure that the 'multiplication factor' notified in their respective states is in conformity with the legal provisions

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in the First Schedule to the RFCTLARR Act, 2013, as also advised by the Attorney General of India.

6.9 Keeping the aforesaid in view, it is clarified as under:

- (i) The multiplication factor by which the 'market value' is to be multiplied in case of urban areas shall be 1.00 (One) as specified in the First Schedule. The 'Urban Area' shall mean the area situated within and up to the boundary of the Urban Local Body as notified by the concerned State Government (i.e. a Municipal Corporation/ Council/ Committee, by whatever name it may be called).
- (ii) The multiplication factor by which the market value is to be multiplied in case of rural areas (from the end-point of the urban limit) shall be the one as notified by the concerned State Government, being the appropriate government for such state. It may be noted that the Multiplication Factor notified by the State shall remain the same for the state government and the central government projects. There cannot be two different sets of multiplication factors in the same state, as already clarified by the Department of Land Resources, Ministry of Rural Development, vide its OM dated 8th May, 2017.
- (iii) As regards the Multiplication Factor in the case of rural areas in the Union Territories (other than Puducherry), the Multiplication Factor shall be 2 (Two) in terms of the DoLR Notification No. S.O.425 (E) dated 09.02.2016 till the same is reviewed by the Department of Land Resources.
- (iv) The Multiplication Factor by which the market value is to be multiplied in case of rural areas situated in the Union Territory of Puducherry shall be the same as notified by the Government of Union Territory of Puducherry.

7. Bulk Acquisitions/ Purchase of Land through Consent of Landowners

7.1 Various state governments have come out with their respective guidelines/ policies/ rules/ statutes for acquisition of land on consent basis. Proposals have been received in MoRTH from such state governments for acquition of land for the National Highways within their jurisdiction under their respective consent acquisition policies/ guidelines/ statutes. MoRTH has agreed to the proposals of the following states and issued OMs in this connection subject to the condition that the compensation amount paid in such cases is in consonance with the provisions of the RFCTLARR Act 2013, as applicable to the NH Act, 1956 for the purpose:

- 7.2 In supersession of the above OMs, it has been decided by the Competent Authority that following guidelines shall be followed henceforth with immediate effect and until further orders regarding Bulk acquisition/ Purchase of Land through Consent of landowners:-
 - (i) There is a specific Central statute for acquisition of land for the National Highways i.e. National Highways Act,1956. As such, legally, the Central Government and its authorised project executing agencies are competent to acquire land for the construction/ development of National Highways under the NH Act, 1956 and the States do not have a case to insist that the land for the NHs in their jurisdiction should be acquired under the statutes/ policies framed by the State Governments/ UT Administrations.
 - (ii) However, considering the urgent need for minimizing litigation and ensuring early availability of land for completion of the NH projects, land for NH projects can be procured through direct purchase with the consent of the landowners in accordance with the existing Acts/ Rules/ Policies of the concerned State Governments subject to the condition that the total amount of compensation so worked out will be no more than what is payable when the land is acquired under the NH Act, 1956, which in any case is in conformity with the compensation payable in accordance with the provisions of RFCTLARR Act, 2013.
 - (iii) Further, MoRTH/ NHAI/ NHIDCL would also be agreeable to acquisition of land for the NH Projects in accordance with such consent mechanism of the state subject to the condition that the concerned State Government/ UT Administration agrees to bear the incremental cost, if any, from its own resources. To illustrate, if the amount of total compensation payable for one hectare land in terms of the First Schedule to the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 [including the amount calculated @ 12% in terms of Section 30 (3) of RFCTLARR Act, 2013] is Rs. 1.50 crore/ hectare and the amount determined under the consent mechanism of the state government works out to Rs. 1.75 crore/ hectare, the State Government/ UT Administration would have to



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bear the differential compensation amount of Rs. 25.00 Lakh/ hecatre from its own sources.

(iv) Henceforth, with the above principles having been laid down, there will be no need to issue any state specific guidelines on the subject.

8. Acquisition of land for Missing Plots

The Ministry has issued detailed guidelines vide its letter dated 15.03.2016 for acquisition of land through consent of landowners, preferably limited to 10% of total quantum of land acquisition in a construction package in the cases of (i) Missing plots which are inadvertently left out from the bulk acquisition, and/ or (ii) additional land required due to alteration of alignment at implementation stage. These guidelines shall continue to remain in force until further orders.

Notification of a stretch as a NH under Section 2 of the NH Act, 1956 before initiating the process of Land Acquisition under Section 3 of the NH Act?

(i) The issue as to whether it is necessary to notify a certain stretch as a National Highway under Section 2 of the NH Act before initiating the process of acquisition of land for building a National Highway under Section 3 of the NH Act has come up for consideration. The Ministry was of the view that Section 2 and Section 3 of the NH Act are independent of each other. This issue was also referred to the Ld. Attorney General for his opinion. The Attorney General has advised vide his supplementary reference dated 24.12.2017 as under:

"Section 3A deals with the power to acquire land and Section 3A(1) provides as follows:

3A Power to acquire land, etc. - (1) Where the Central Government is satisfied that for a public purpose any land is required for the building, maintenance, management or operation of a national highway or part thereof, it may, by notification in the Official Gazette, declare its intention to acquire such land.

Under Section 3A(1), the Central Government may acquire land for the purpose of <u>building</u> a National Highway. The term 'building' is not defined in the National Highways Act. The New Webster's Dictionary of the English Language (Deluxe Encyclopedic Edn) defines 'building' as ' the act of one who builds'. The term 'build' is defined as 'to construct or erect, as a house; to form by uniting materials into a regular structure; to make; to establish by gradual means; to raise as on a support or foundation'. When the Central Government notifies land for acquisition, the nature of these lands may be paddy fields or waste lands or vacant lands. These lands cannot be called a Highway. What is acquired is only land without a Highway existing at the



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time. The very concept of a Highway is defined in common law as 'a way over which there exists a public right or passage... at all seasons of the year freely... to pass and re-pass without let or hindrance ('Halsbury's Laws of England, 4th Edn. Vol 21 Page 9). Vacant lands and paddy fields can never be termed as Highways. It is only when the road is built/ constructed and established, and is able to take traffic, and when a passage comes into existence for persons to pass and re-pass, that it can be notified.

In view of the above, my answer to the query is that it is not necessary to notify a road project as a National Highway in terms of Section 2 of the National Highways Act, 1956 for initiating the process of land acquisition under Section 3A of the Act.

I advise accordingly."

- (ii) Accordingly, it is clarified that it is not necessary that a stretch must be notified as a National Highway under Section 2 of the NH Act, 1956 before initiating the process of land acquisition under Section 3 for building a National Highway.
- Competent Authority for Land Acquisition (CALA) and due diligence at the time of determination of compensation amount by the Competent Authority.
 - (i) The Central Government (i.e. the Ministry of Road Transport & Highways) appoints the Competent Authority for Land Acquisition (CALA) in exercise of its powers under Section 3(a) of the NH Act, 1956. As such, the CALA appointed by the Central Government, is obliged to take all action for acquisition of land under the NH Act, 1956 and the guidelines issued by the Central Government on the subject.
 - (ii) It may be noted that the provisions contained in the RFCTLARR Act, 2013 from Section 26 to Section 30 are in seriatum i.e. sequential. Para 5.8 of these guidelines may be referred in this behalf. As such, an illustration on how the total compensation amount is to be calculated is given in Annexure-4. This has to be strictly followed by all CALAs appointed by the Central Government.
 - (iii) Certain undesirable practices have come to notice of the Central Government. These include change in the nature of land or adoption of incorrect classification of land for determination of market value of land. It may be noted that the nature of land has to be taken as recorded in the revenue records on the day of publication of Section 3A notification. For instance, if some landowner/ interested person has raised a factory building or a commercial building upon the land under acquisition without obtaining the "Change in Land Use" from the competent authority prescribed by the



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state government, he/ she cannot take the benefit of treatment of such land as "Industrial" or "Commercial". Therefore, due diligence has to be exercised by the CALA while determining the land use/ nature of land and working out the market value of land.

- (Iv) It may be further noted that the market value of land is to be determined as on the date of publication of the preliminary Notification under Section 3A of the NH Act, 1956. It is for this reason that in addition to the market value of land and solatium, the landowner is also paid an amount calculated @ 12% per annum from the date of initial notification under Section 3A till the announcement of Award or possession of land, whichever is earlier. Instances have come to notice where the landowners/ interested persons have undertaken certain improvements over the land notified under Section 3A after the publication of notification in order to enhance the quantum of compensation. This would include plantation of trees on such land to add value. As such, the CALAs are duty bound to ignore any improvement done over the notified land after the date of notification while determining the compensation amount and announcing the Award under Section 3G of the NH Act, 1956.
- (v) The CALA, while announcing the Award under Section 3G, shall append a certificate at the end of his Award that he/ she has strictly followed the legal provisions and these guidelines in determination of the compensation amount.

11. Disbursement of Compensation amount and possession of land

- (i) It has been observed that the process of disbursement of compensation amount to the landowners or the persons interested therein goes on for a long period for a variety of reasons, which leads to delays in taking possession of the land acquired and required for construction of the highway. Some of the most common reasons are mentioned as under:
 - (a) There are certain landowners who do not maintain their usual residence where the land is situated and can be called as absentee landowners;
 - (b) The land records are not updated and the successors-in-interest are not clearly identified with their respective shares.
- (ii) It is, therefore, important that the CALAs adopt the following procedure in order to ensure that the possession of acquired land is not delayed for any reasons:
 - (a) Apart from issue of notice to the landowner/ person interested therein



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in terms of sub-section (1) of Section 3E of the NH Act, 1956, a public notice may also be published in the same set of two newspapers in which the Notification under Section 3A (3) was published informing the landowners/ persons interested in the acquired land about the announcement of the Award by the CALA in respect of subject land, calling upon them to collect the compensation amount from the office of the CALA within a period of sixty days.

- (b) As soon as the period of 60 days is over, another public notice may be caused to be published in the same set of newspapers, calling upon such landowners to surrender or deliver possession thereof to the competent authority forthwith, failing which the possession shall be taken with the assistance of the local police in accordance with sub-section (2) of Section 3E of the NH Act, 1956.
- (iii) A typical sample/ format of the two sets of Public Notices are enclosed as Annexure - 5.

12. Appointment of Arbitrator under Section 3G(5) of the NH Act, 1956

- (i) Reference is made to Section 3G(5) of the NH Act, 1956 which stipulates that "If the amount determined by the competent authority under sub-section (1) or sub-section (2) is not acceptable to either of the parties, the amount shall, on an application by either of the parties, be determined by the arbitrator to be appointed by the Central Government".
- (ii) Further, attention is also drawn to sub-section (4) of Section 3H of the NH Act, 1956 which stipulates that "If any dispute arises as to the apportionment of the amount or any part thereof or to any person to whom the same or any part thereof is payable, the competent authority shall refer the dispute to the decision of the principal civil court of original jurisdiction within the limits of whose jurisdiction the land is situated."
- (iii) A perusal of the above provisions makes it clear that the jurisdiction of the 'Arbitrator' appointed by the Central Government and that of the 'Principal Civil Court of original jurisdiction' have been clearly demarcated.
- (iv) The CALAs may, while making a reference to the 'Principal Civil Court of original jurisdiction' wherever required, may also seek leave of such Court to deposit the undisbursed amount of compensation in respect of such landowners/ interested persons with the Court so that the possession of such land is not held-up on this account, leading to delays in taking up the highway development works.



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13. Administrative charges for Land Acquistion for NH Projects

A total of 13 states levy administrative charges for acquisition of land for the National Highways. Demi-official communications have been sent at the level of Secretary, MoRTH to Chief secretaries of these states in this behalf. A copy of the said letter, which is self contained, is enclosed as Annexure-6. Action may be taken by all concerned accordingly.

Supersession of previous guidelines:

With the issue of these comprehensively revised guidelines, the guidelines mentioned at Part A of Annexure-1 continue to remain in operation for the time being till these are also comprehensively revised, whereas those mentioned under Part B of Annexure-1 are superseded. These guidelines shall take effect from the date of issue.

15. Savings:

The Ministry has been issuing guidelines on the subject of Land Acquisition from time to time based on clarifications/ developments as these came along, which may have resulted in higher outgo on account of amounts of compensation paid to the landowners. Since it is practically not feasible to recover any such excess paid amount from the landowners/ interested persons, it is clarified that any compensation amount paid in the past in terms of guidelines issued by the Ministry from time to time, and which may not be payable in terms of these revised guidelines, shall be deemed to have been paid as per the extant guidelines and shall not be called into question on account of these revised guidelines.

16. These guidelines, which issue with the approval of the Hon'ble Minister, Road Transport & Highways, may be brought to the notice of all concerned for further necessary action and strict compliance.

Kindly recall my D.O. letter dated 06.07.2017 on the subject of **Administrative Charges** being levied by your state for acquisition of land for the National Highway Projects as a percentage of the compensation amount (copy enclosed for ready reference).

- 2. It may be noted that the states of Andhra Pradesh, Jammu & Kashmir, Karnataka, Odisha, Telangana, Rajasthan, North-Eastern states (except Assam) do not levy any administrative charges for acquisition of land for the National Highways. However, 13 states including your state have been levying these charges as per the details given in Annexure-1. Excepting the state of Uttarakhand (who have agreed with the Ministry's proposal), we have not received any response to my aforesaid DO reference from any other state.
- 3. It is understood that your state has prescribed these charges as a percentage of the amount of compensation towards administrative costs under the rules famed under the 1894 Act. The determination of compensation amount, use of multiplication factor and provision of 100% solatium under the revised law has completely changed the landscape whereby the compensation amount has gone up by 3 to 4 times whereas the prescribed percentage of administrative costs has not been rationalized. On the other hand, the States appoint the Competent Authority for Land Acquisition (CALA) for acquisition of land for the National Highways, who are not committed to this work on full-time basis and the support system is left wanting. As a result, the NHAI/ NHIDCL supplement these resources and deploy Land Acquisition Supporting Units comprising of retired revenue officials and other support systems. As such, it is the need of the hour to re-visit these charges and rationalise the same.
- 4. The administrative costs involved in Land Acquisition for NHs and associated facilities by a state involve the process/ steps as tabulated in the enclosed Annexure-2. A perusal of the details given in the enclosure shows that even if an officer i.e. CALA, along with a supporting staff of two personnel, and then the costs associated with the functions discharged by the Arbitrators appointed under Section 3-G(5) for settlement of arbitral issues, are deployed on full-time on the given jobs, their salaries, office expenses, office accommodation, use of vehicle(s) etc. for a period of one full year also would only be a small fraction of the administrative charges vis-à-vis the amount calculated @ 2.5% of the compensation amount.
- 5. You would appreciate that construction of NHs generate a lot of value and economic activity. As a matter of fact, these serve as major arteries of economic development and growth in the state concerned. Ideally, keeping in view that the state is the major beneficiary of the economic gains arising from National Highways developed/ constructed within its jurisdiction, the administrative costs should be borne by the state government as its token contribution in this behalf. You would agree that the administrative costs on land acquisition for the National Highways cannot be reckoned as a source of additional revenue generation for the state. As such, the states



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are expected to contribute their bit in this endeavour and the least they can do is to assist in the administrative process as part of their contribution. In any case, treatment of levy of administrative charges for Land Acquisition by the State concerned as a source of revenue generation, beyond the actual costs incurred in the process, is unacceptable.

- 6. Notwithstanding the above, in case you still decide to levy and recover the administrative costs for acquisition of land for the National Highway Projects in your state, I request you to kindly revisit the existing level of administrative costs and take recourse to any of the following options:
 - (i) Raise a bill for the actual expenditure incurred by the State Government on land acquisition for the National Highways (this would entail a complex accounting problem in terms of working out the part time and effort of the deployed officers); or
 - (ii) Consider prescribing a fixed amount per hectare acquisition cost (as in the case of Haryana, it is Rs. 1.00 lakh per acre or Rs. 2.5 lakh per hectare); or
 - (iii) Cap the administrative charges at a uniform rate of 2.5% of the compensation amount, while allowing for adjustment of the expenditure incurred by the Project Implementing Agencies of this Ministry, on engagement of the Special Land Acquisition Support Units to assist the CALAs.
- 7. The project executing entities of MoRTH (e.g. NHAI/ NHIDCL and others) have been advised to restrict the payment of administrative charges up to 2.5% of the compensation amount in respect of land acquisition for all the on-going and future NH projects. I am constrained to clarify that it will be extremely difficult for the MoRTH and its project executing agencies to proceed further with their NH projects in your state without any further reference on the subject in the event your state has any reservations in accepting the above principle. I would be grateful if the Ministry could be informed about the decision of the state in the matter.

- The States of J&K, Punjab, Rajasthan, Kamataka, Andhra Pradesh, Telengana, and Tamil Nadu and all North-esat States (except Assam) are not levying any administrative costs/ charges for acquisition of land for the NHAI projects. In case of Haryana also, the rates are very reasonable and the state has never insisted on payment of the same.

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
